

COLLECT \$17,000 CITY TAX ARREARS

Office Flooded by Delinquents Anxious to Avoid Double Penalty.

More than \$17,000 in 1924 arrears of city taxes have been collected during the past three days, and great efforts have been given to secure a final accounting before the end of April. After this month a penalty assessment of 10 per cent. will be placed on the present five per cent. bill going into effect.

able to save five per cent. of their taxes, delinquent taxpayers are storming the tax collector's office and bringing in their checks and cash at the rate of almost \$6,000 a day. Last year's arrears of taxes amounted to \$242,000, a part of which has been paid since the last installment was due in October. However, nearly \$200,000 taxes remain uncollected.

A special corps of clerks, recruited from the tax office and clerk's department, as well as from outside, are engaged in making out tax notices for 25,000 delinquent taxpayers in view of the change in the receipt system. It is expected that time in handling records will be cut down more than 50 per cent by arrangements that are now being made.

LIQUOR SHOPS HAVE BUSY OPENING DAY

Crowds Storm One Regina Store—Chinaman First Customer.

Canadian Press Despatch. Regina, Sask., April 17.—Promptly at the scheduled time Saskatchewan liquor stores opened at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. Two Regina stores presented a remarkable contrast when the opening hour arrived. One was swamped with business, while the other was by comparison almost idle.

Long before 11 o'clock crowds started to gather around the first named. The sidewalk immediately in front of the shop was packed solidly. All sorts, classes and conditions of people were in the crowd. They came in automobiles, a few in wagons, and a host on foot. Within two minutes of the opening of the big cash register was ringing continuously.

A Chinese, a rather old man, and a resident of Regina for many years, was the first to get his order filled. He wasted no time in reading price tags, but went down on the order form what he wanted, secured it and hastened away with a bottle of Chinese whiskey under his arm.

He secured the second bottle of the same brand. While the inside of the store was so full of people it was difficult to move there was practically no confusion.

The first nominated was Percy V. Dawe of Cadillac, Mich. The nomination was at once seconded, and a resolution was introduced to carry the nomination. This was carried unanimously, with applause for the two candidates.

Frank Mulholland then stepped forward to address the delegates and to state the growth and reasons for the existence of Rotary in a brilliant address. "The Genesis and Genius of Rotary," he stated.

In a brief address before starting his address, Mr. Mulholland informed his hearers that his father had been born near London, and remarked that it was like returning home again.

Then turning to his subject, he griped his audience with the earnestness of his appeal and thundering delivery.

Rotary is Necessary. "Rotary is found necessary in the nature of man," he stated. "Social intercourse is an essential today as it was in the time of Adam."

"So it was that Paul Harris, isolated in a great city, saw the need for the development of a social life. So with three friends he convened the first meeting in Chicago in 1905. And see what it has brought. Did he see the end of the struggle that now exists in the stand of Rotary?"

He then traced the spread of Rotary all over the world, and the first big convention at Chicago in 1915. "At that meeting," he said, "it was predicted that the Rotary wheel would spread all over the world and the face of Paul Harris would be as familiar to the public as that of Abraham Lincoln."

"Out of the 1912 convention at Duluth came the idea of Rotary International."

"The world war, which broke in 1914, held the spread of Rotary to other countries, but today there are now clubs in Great Britain. During the war the work was developed, however, in the United States, Canada and Cuba."

"At that time the clubs in other countries are composed of nationals. The good of Rotary is to spread it to other than English-speaking nations."

British Ideals in Rotary. "The ideals and steadfastness of the British Isles are woven into Rotary. You cannot take away the work done here by delegates at various conventions held. Their ideals stand."

"What then, my fellows, are the present purposes of this vast organization? They are the resolutions we stand for, and the carrying of them through."

"The truths of the Bible and of ancient times to do good for the other life expressed in the Rotary of today. Men of all religions and no religions are united in making this world a better place to live in."

"We have assembled here as an organization rich in new treasure and with the task of dedicating these truths in business life today."

"If a man thinks everyone is his friend he will soon find it so. This world needs to be loosened up with human kindness. Rotary has taught men to think and to apply the golden rule in life. The Rotary club is a melting pot, where each man puts in the best he has got. The important thing about Rotary is what it does to man only, and I cannot do everything. But I can do something and by the grace of God I will do that thing."

One Lifter—Twenty Leathers. "Wherever you go you will find one lifter and twenty leathers. Which are you? The faith of Rotary is in individual responsibility. No man is worth anything to Rotary who cannot lift more than his own burden. Rotary tries to deliver the capacity in man to serve and the means to carry it out."
