bers of the national councils to urge their respective governments to accept, if they have not already done so, the optional clause in the statute for the court of international justice, declaring that they are prepared to accept the jurisdiction of the court for all disputes that may come within the scope of judicial decision."

As the disarmament resolution was considered, the German delegation announced that while sympathizing with its tenor for gradual simultaneous disarmament, it would abstain from voting because it felt that the clause stating that the council recognizes "that nations will not agree to disarm until they feel some sense of security" involved political questions still under discussion among several governments.

Princess Cantacuzene of Rumania contended that the resolution did not tread on political grounds, but Lady Aberdeen, the president of the council, disagreed with her.

There was no debate, but a German delegate presented a statement declaring that she and her colleagues in the council would work for co-operation with the league.

Toronto, May 9.—That the recent phenomenon when people of the south shore of Lake Ontario were able to see the lights of Toronto and nearby towns, 30 miles away, proves that the earth is flat, is the assertion of T. W. Winckler, Toronto civil engineer.

Mr. Winckler is the chief Toronto

exponent of the geocentric theory of the cosmos, which, in other words, is the belief that the earth is flat. He quoted the fact that the dip in the earth in 30 miles would be 600 feet if the earth were round, which would make it impossible for those people to have seen lights of Toronto, and other instances and experiments, all tending to show that the surface of the earth is flat.
