Prince to Visit Brantford. Official intimation to Brantford has been given that the Prince of Wales will visit Brantford in August with an especial desire to review the returned soldiers. Mayor MacBride commented:

"The Prince will be given a real welcome in Brantford, not merely because he is a prince, but mainly because he is the representative of the greatest empire of freedom the world has ever known and because he will be Britain's future king."

"Britain's kings have ceased to be royalists in the original sense and are to-day just as democratic in their opinions and ideals as the humblest citizen of the empire."

"British labor honors the King. Brantford will do likewise."

A Serious Charge.

Joe Manenti of Hamilton pleaded not guilty before Police Magistrate Graydon, London, to charges of forgery or having in his possession bogus American ten dollar bills. He elected to be tried by a jury, and was sent back on remand for a preliminary hearing on July 3.

Manenti was arrested in Hamilton on a London warrant. It is alleged, in consequence of information obtained from Lebert Kressella, a Russian youth, arrested here charged with passing such notes. Kressella was repeatedly remanded while the police sought the actual forger. The alleged work is said to have been skillfully done by raising genuine dollar bills to have the appearance of ten dollar notes.

J. B. Powell is Dead.

The death occurred at Guelph of Mr. J. B. Powell, Inspector of Inland Revenue, following an illness of only one week. Mr. Powell was seventy-one years of age, and was born in Guelph. He has been in the Inland Revenue Department for forty-six years, the last six years of which he has been Inspector for the district from Brantford to Windsor. He was widely known all over western Ontario. He leaves six children.

Rev. Voelker Leaving Preston.

Rev. Mr. Voelker, pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran church, Preston has ended in his resignation as pastor and will leave for his new charge at Pembroke the latter part of July. The resignation came somewhat as a surprise to the members of the church and it was with the deepest regret that the congregation learned that their pastor was about to leave them. Rev. Mr. Voelker has been pastor of the church for some years and was highly respected by his congregation and the citizens of the town. In all probability he will preach his farewell sermon the third Sunday in July.

The woodworkers' strike in Preston has been settled satisfactorily to both manufacturers and men. The above result was reached at a meeting of all concerned on Saturday afternoon. The men all returned to work Monday morning at 7 o'clock but started on the 9-hour day this morning. A committee was appointed to draw up an agreement satisfactory to the employers and employees. Saturday's meeting was a very harmonious one and the strike was settled after being on a day and a half.
