GUN CARRIAGE FOR CANNON

Historic Cannon Will be Properly Mounted and an Ornament to Park.

Last week two gun carriages arrived here addressed to the Town Clerk and they were hauled to Riverside Park and placed in position there.

Later in the week town teams hauled the two historic cannon which were presented to the town some years ago and which have remained in the mud since the fire, to the park and they will be properly mounted with the muzzles pointing out over the waters of the historic Restigouche, guardians as of yore of its safety from the attacks of its enemies. The gun carriages were procured from the Militia Department from St. John.

This action by the town, after such a long delay, is being very favorably commented upon, and the members of the present Council are proving that they appreciate beauty and orderliness. Riverside Park will be in a few years be a beauty spot of which all will be proud. Mr. John Cameron has volunteered to superintend the planting of trees and other citizens from all sections of the town are taking a deep interest in the work.

Last week some of the visitors from Moncton were given a drive about town and greatly admired the site of the park and remarked what a spot of beauty it could be made.

D. E. RICHARDS PASSED AWAY

Died At His Home Here Friday Morning—Was a Captain of Industry.

Campbellton learned with great sorrow last Friday morning of the death of Mr. Daniel E. Richards, which took place at his home between six and seven o'clock.

Mr. Richards had been ill for some time and his demise was not unexpected. During last winter he was not in good health and went to New York for medical advice, but despite everything which medical science could accomplish he passed peacefully away as above stated, surrounded by members of his family.

Deceased who was 52 years of age was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Richards, and was born here. Early in his life he went into the lumber business with his father, and his careful study of that business is no doubt due the great success of his various enterprises with which he was connected. He was president of the following companies: Richards Manufacturing Co. Ltd., Continental Lumber Co., Restigouche Lumber Co., Restigouche Log Driving & Boom Co., Tohique Lumber Co.

He always took a deep interest in the welfare of Campbellton and for a number of years represented Ward 1 on the Council board. The various enterprises with which he was connected contributed much to the prosperity of our town. In 1910 when five years ago, Campbellton, he was one of the first citizens to render assistance and help in rebuilding, as well as using his influence in the Council and the various committees for the welfare of the community. Mrs. Richards, two sons, George and Ted, two daughters Kathleen and Gwendolyn, three sisters, Mrs. Mac Moore, Mrs. 2 Richards Miller, employees of Campbellton, Mrs. James Evans of Campbellton, and Mrs. Chas. Somers of Moncton, and two brothers William S. and John, both of Campbellton survive.

The family have the sympathy of all in their bereavement.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon and was probably one of the largest ever held here. Carriages and autos were present from all sections of the North Shore. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Campbell, pastor of the United Baptist Church, of which deceased was a member, assisted by Rev. H. Miller. Members of the Town Council attended in a body.

The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Geo. Cutler, Fred Beatty, W. F. Napier, R. B. Rossborough, M. M. Mowat, W. H. Miller, Alexander McLennan and Joseph McLatchy.

The floral tributes were many and very beautiful. Among which were wreaths from employees of No. 1 and No. 2 Richards Miller, employees of Campbellton, Mrs. James Evans of Campbellton, Mrs. Chas. Somers of Moncton, and two brothers William S. and John, both of Campbellton survive.

Besides these there was a profusion of numerous and beautiful personal floral offerings.

Interment was in the Rural Cemetery.

NEW FIRM IS OPENING HERE

Messrs. Ferguson & Wallace Will Open New Gents Furnishing Store Oct. 1st.

Campbellton is to have another gents furnishing store, and judging by past experience it will be an up-to-date one, as both the members of the new firm, W. M. Ferguson and G. A. Wallace, have had long experience in this line.

One of the stores in the Governor block has been leased from Mr. Gallagher, and the new stock is arriving daily. The formal opening will take place Wednesday, Oct. 1st.

Both these young men have had special training in the gents furnishing line.

Mr. Ferguson started with Mr. Jas. Killo and when Messrs. Fraser, Fraser and Co. purchased the business continued with the owners.

In 1910 Messrs. H. W. Ferguson and W. M. Ferguson established business under the name of Ferguson Bros. In 1914 upon the outbreak of the war Harry W. enlisted with the 25th Battalion and was killed in March 1915. W. M. sold out the business and entered the military service in the 25th Battalion in 1916, served overseas in the spring of 1917 and served in the C.P.C. until discharged in July 1919.

Mr. G. A. Wallace commenced his business career with the late D. J. Bruce, under whose most careful guidance he gained knowledge of tailoring, which in later years caused him to be looked upon not only as an authority on men's wear, but as a most satisfactory salesman. After Mr. Bruce's death he was appointed manager of the business for the estate and continued in that capacity until its transfer to Mr. A. A. Andrew, when he became buyer for the store. On March 1915 Mr. Wallace enlisted, going to England, thence to France where he served with the 25th Nova Scotia Battalion for over three years.

We have no doubt but that these young men will enjoy their full share of public patronage.

NEW APPOINTMENT.

Mr. H. J. Callaghan of Callaghan, N. B. has been appointed Police Inspector of the C. G. Railways, with headquarters at Newcastle.

Chief Inspector Wilson was in town this week and announced that D. A. Kean of this town had been appointed liquor inspector for Restigouche with jurisdiction over all that part of the County, including the towns of Campbellton and Dalhousie, from St. John's to Bellouche River. He will be assisted by Mr. Dickinson, while Mr. LeClave of Grimmer will be inspector for L. N. R. points.

Mr. Wilson says he is determined to make Restigouche as dry as when Inspector Mann had charge.

Inspector Kean was recommended by the Local G. W. V. A. and hopes to have the moral backing of the institution, as well as all right minded citizens.

FOUR ARRESTS IN ROBBERY

C. N. R. Freight Conductor and Others Believed Implicated in Limited Robbery.

Quebec, Sept. 22—After five days of incessant work during which every possible clue was followed to the limit, and practically every place in the province of Quebec was combed over, the police made four arrests in the city of Quebec today and believe they have captured the bandits who figured in the hold-up and rifled the mail car on the Ocean Limited train between Lewis and Montagny on the morning of Thursday, September 18th. The men arrested are George Topping, a freight conductor on the Canadian National Railways, and J. Bonarville T. Proseau, a former garage owner, who are believed to be the men who disguised with masks and carrying revolvers, entered the mail car and after holding the hands and feet of the five mail clerks, ransacked the mail and got away with \$71,000 in five and ten dollar notes. The other two men arrested, who are held as material witnesses are George Lavasseur, a brother-in-law of Topping, and Napoleon Boulanger of Lewis.

Money Not Located.

While the police have not located the missing money, they hope to be able to do so in a very short time, and in the meantime they have the men used by the bandits when they made their haul.
