Ottawa, Ont., Ang. 27.—The Domin-ion Statistician has been investigating the cost of education in the several provinces of the Dominion, and has prepared under the head of "Special Statistics" an interesting chapter for his Year Book. Data collected for the years 1838 and 1833 show that Manitoba expends proportionately more upon education, that is, for Public schools, than any other province in the Dominion.
