

DUTY ON MILK RAISE BY .5.

Senate Makes Tariff 2 1/2 Cents On a Gallon.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(Associated Press Cable.)—A duty of 2 1/2 cents a gallon milk, as compared with the present rate in the Senate bill, was approved by the Senate, 48 to 18, after a two-hour fight.

Senator Walsh, Massachusetts, led the fight against the rate, which he said was another instance of an attempt to reduce trade with Canada. He held that the rate would constitute a penalty on the people of New England, who depend on Canada for their extra supply of milk and cream during the summer months.

The committee rate on cream of 23 1/2 cents a gallon was approved, 40 to 19, after a long fight.

A report of the tariff commission on the operation of the emergency tariff rates, which was made public today, declares that these rates had the effect of cutting down the importations of wheat and flour from Canada.

The report is being widely studied by senators in connection with the discussion now in progress in the Senate.

FARM PRICES RISING. The commission largely avoids general conclusions and its report indicates that a special study was made of the facts regarding the price movements of each commodity covered by the emergency rates.

NOT TAKEN SERIOUSLY. OTTAWA, June 29.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—The effect of a new United States tariff on Canadian exports of milk, as approved by the Senate, could not be precisely judged by officials of the department of agriculture here today, although it was not felt that the proposed advance of 1/2-cent a gallon over the present rate on the product would have any considerable effect on the export of milk to the States.

DERBY FLOCK RAVAGED BY SHEEP-KILLING DOGS. OWEN, SOUND, June 29.—Fourteen sheep, ewes and lambs, the property of Charles Barber, a farmer of Derby Township, will have to be killed as a result of their being worried by dogs last night.

WANTS GREENWOOD TAKEN OFF PAY ROLL. LONDON, June 29.—The Pall Mall Gazette, which usually supports the Government, has an editorial in this evening's issue demanding Premier Lloyd George's attention to Sir Hamar Greenwood, whose duties as chief secretary for Ireland were finished with the signing of the Irish Free State treaty, but who remains "magnificently remunerated" for doing nothing at all in spite of the outcry for economy.

DR. SEN HOPEFUL. Plans to Retake Canton and Re-Establish Southern Regime. CANTON, June 29.—Undismayed by reports of further support for the move to unify China along lines which he has not approved, Dr. Sun Yat Sen is holding on to the presidency of the Canton Government with a tenacity apparently equal to that with which he clung to the ideal of a Chinese democracy in the days before the Manchus were overthrown.

CANNOT HELP THEM. Judge, However, Sympathizes With Couple Who Bought Ojibway Lots. TORONTO, June 29.—Though declaring that his sympathies are with Dr. Charles W. Hughes and his wife, of Punxsutawney, Pa., who had invested \$7,728 in land at Ojibway, described as a highly speculative venture, Justice Orde declares that they have, by their own conduct deprived themselves of any legal or equitable right to relief, and he dismisses their application for the Ojibway Realty Company, Limited, and the Ojibway Townsite Company, Limited, for possession of their contracts to purchase and for refund of their money.

NOKOL HEADS FOUND GUILTY

Slater and Thompson Convicted At Toronto of Theft.

REMANDED TILL MONDAY

Counsel Makes Application For Stated Case.

TORONTO, June 29.—(Canadian Press Dispatch.)—Found guilty at a trial which lasted 17 days on three counts of conspiracy, theft of and receiving "a large sum of money," Hiram F. Slater and Leslie J. Thompson, Nokul promoters, were remanded in custody until Monday morning by Judge Coatsworth in criminal sessions today.

Slater and Thompson were charged with conspiracy, theft of and receiving, \$500,000 belonging to the Nokul Fuel Company during the years 1919, 1920 and 1921. The company was formed to place briquettes on the market and shares were advanced from 10 cents to \$100. Slater and Thompson, in promoting the company, received thousands of shares, some of which were sold to persons who were not made aware of the fact that they were buying personal belongings.

MAY LAUNCH LEGAL ACTION OVER CONTROL OF LAKE OF WOODS

TORONTO, June 29.—(Special to The Free Press.)—An announcement of the Government's plan of action in the dispute over the control of the waters of the Lake of the Woods will be made probably by Premier Drury tomorrow at Smith's Falls, where he is to address a big public meeting. The premier will go to Smith's Falls from Milton, where he went to-night for a private meeting with the executive of the King Government's measure to re-open the Ontario Government's plan to acquire the Lake of the Woods situation.

PERILS OF FATHERHOOD

County police, accompanied by Frank Appleyard, executive officer of the Kent children's Aid Society, during a trip of investigation to the Town of Tilbury discovered seven cases of illegitimate births in Tilbury and the surrounding country. Investigations will be continued to compel the male parents to provide for these children until they reach the age of 16, which provision is contained in the new law passed by the Legislature. They also laid information against one Tilbury resident for being in possession of liquor and another against two people who are living together illegally.

CHALLENGE GAS SERVICE CHARGE

Consumers Apply to Referee for Prohibitory Order

ASK RETURN OF MAY FEE

Understanding Was Companies Would Not Collect

CHATHAM, June 29.—F. H. Brisson, president of the Natural Gas Consumers' Association of Western Ontario, is applying to Gas Referee G. H. Henderson for an order prohibiting the Chatham Gas Company and all other producing and distributing gas companies from charging a dollar a month service charge for the month of June, and also asking for the return of the service charge which was levied for the month of May.

At the recent gas hearing in St. Thomas, the referee failed to make this order abolishing the service charge, although he stated at the time that he believed it was assured that this hearing by the Union Gas Company that it would not press the charge upon the consumers. The referee declined to grant the St. Thomas company the right to impose the same charge. In spite of this the Chatham Gas Company collected the service charge for May, and it is believed they intend to collect the same charge for June.

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JOHN AVERY, OF LOBO, SUCCUMBS TO PNEUMONIA

ILBERTON, June 29.—John Avery, of Lobo, died on Tuesday evening at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. Macintosh, of Ilberton, after two weeks' illness with pneumonia. The funeral was held this afternoon from his late home in Lobo. Service was held in the Presbyterian church at Vanneck, under the direction of the pastor, the Rev. Mr. Campbell. Interment was at Ivan and the service there was in charge of his Masonic brethren. Mr. Avery was 23 years old, and his surviving family consists of a sister and three brothers. His father died of pneumonia six weeks ago, and the mother suffered a stroke a year ago and has been helpless since that time. Deep sympathy is felt for this afflicted family. E. 50,000 More Starving Russian Children

have been allotted to the Save the Children Fund workers in the famine area about Saratov, by the All-British Committee.
