

# SUMMARY OF NEWS.

**Colonial Bank.**—At the Colonial Bank meeting held on the 3rd inst., at the London Tavern, it was announced that the directors considered it again prudent to abstain from declaring a dividend. Although the hope is held out that improvement will eventually take place in the affairs of the company, many of the shareholders seem inclined to propose a dissolution as the readiest way of getting rid of an unprofitable concern. Dissatisfaction was also expressed at the expense incurred for management, both at home and abroad; and notwithstanding the directors were much disinclined to give any positive information on that head, sufficient was elicited to show that large salaries had been paid to the officers of the Bank, they had in certain cases been inefficient and negligent of their duties. The meeting was not a stormy one, neither was much discussion indulged in, but the conversation that did take place exhibited an unpleasant feeling as a thing between the directors and shareholders, the former appearing to consider themselves hardly dealt with, in being pressed for future information than that contained in the report, and the latter appearing to consider that proper courtesy was not paid them in least endeavoring to satisfy them on the state of their own affairs.

A meeting was held at Glasgow last week, in the Trades Hall, to consider the project of erecting cheap public baths, and to petition Parliament in favour of improved sanitary arrangements in large towns. The Lord Provost took the chair, and the meeting was crowded. Resolutions for establishing baths were unanimously carried, and a subscription commenced in aid of that object.

A forest has been discovered below the level of the water in Loch Oich, in the course of the Great Caledonian Canal, which is now undergoing repair. The waters of the loch being low, some hundreds of acres of all sizes have been taken out; they are chiefly of fine black oak, and many are of large size and in high preservation, whilst others are cherished as if by fire.

The Duchess of Gloucester gave a fete champetre, at Montague House, on Monday, to a large assemblage of the aristocracy. Among the amusements for the guests was a rowing-match on the Thames, for sixty shillings; the competitors being watermen.

The great Waterley B.N. for the purpose of assisting the funds for the South African war, at Edinburgh, took place on Monday night, at Willis's Rooms. It was highly successful; 1,432 tickets were sold, and there will be a thousand pounds clear for the Monument funds. Among the dances was a quadrille of characters from the Waterly novels, forty-eight in number, which was arranged and conducted by the Marchioness of Londonderry. The Duchess of Gloucester, the Duke of Cambridge, and the Hereditary Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, head the brilliant list of company present.

**The Marriage of Lord Charles Wellesley.**—The Marriage of Lord Charles Wellesley, son of the Duke of Wellington, and the Hon. Miss Pierrepont, took place on the 9th inst. at St. George's Church, Haguer-square, in the presence of a distinguished circle of the nobility, and an immense assemblage of company, the Church being literally crowded in every part. The newly-married couple afterwards left town for Strathfield.

The Emperor of Russia, while in England, always slept on the ground, on a leather tick stuffed with straw, as being more conducive to health than a leather bed.

**The Manufactures of Paisley.**—At the moment, when the manufacturing skill of France, is lowered and promoted by government awards and bounties, it is exceedingly gratifying that the skill of our own native weavers has afforded another proof of their unsurpassed skill and industry. A scarf shawl has been submitted to us, the invention of Messrs. Graham and Smith of Ludgate street. Four columns are so constructed as to fold into 20 different effects, either colour can be worn alone, any two together, three, or all four, according to the caprice of the wearer. Mr. R. Kerr, of Paisley, is the enterprising manufacturer who has accomplished the weaving in one piece of this extraordinary shawl, which is pronounced a scientific production of far greater merit than anything of the kind that has appeared at the French exposition of manufactures.

**West India and Mexican Mails.**—A notice has been issued by the General Post-office, that, in the event of the 2nd of the month falling on Sunday, the West India and Mexican Mails, &c., which, in such cases, have hitherto been made up on the morning of the 3rd, will, in future, be made up and despatched from London on the morning of the first of the month.

**Rebecca in a New Character.**—In consequence of some tombs having been defaced at Vaynor churchyard, the churchwardens very properly caused the stile to be walled up, but on Saturday night, or early on Sunday morning, it was re-beelected, so that a waggon might almost enter that sacred piece of land.—*Cardiff Advertiser.*

The Emperor of Russia returned to Saint Petersburg in perfect health, during the night between the 18th and 19th ult. The state of health of her Imperial Highness, the Grand Duchess Alexandra, consort of Prince Frederick of Hesse, was considered to be hopeless.

**The Bank Charter Bill.**—As the different enactments of the Bank Charter Bill come into operation at different periods, we think we shall render a useful service to our readers by specifying the date of the commencement of the operation of each enactment. 1. The division of the departments of the Bank of England takes place upon the 31st day of August, 1844. 2. All persons

may demand notes for gold at £3 17s 9d per ounce, before and after the 31st August 1844. 3. Bank of England exempt from stamp duty "from and after 31st of August 1844," bank to allow £180,000 per annum from the same date. 4. No new bank of issue to be allowed "from and after the passing of this act." 5. Existing banks of issue to give notice to the commissioners of stamps and taxes of their claim to issue to the extent of their average issue during the twelve weeks preceeding the 31st April—such notice to be given "within one month next after the passing of this act." 6. No bank to issue upon an average of four weeks a higher amount than that allowed by the commissioners "after the 10th day of October 1844." 7. A return of the name of every bank, and of every partner in each banking firm or company, shall be made to the commissioners of stamps and taxes "on the 1st day of January in each year, or within fifteen days thereafter." 8. The agreements that have been made between the Bank of England and the bankers named in schedule C, shall cease and determine "on the 31st day of December next." 9. The compensation of one per cent. to such banks shall cease "on the 1st day of August 1866." 10. Any bank trading in London, or within twenty-five miles thereof, though the number of partners exceed six may draw, accept, or indorse bills of exchange "from and after the passing of this act." 11. The exclusive privileges of the Bank of England shall continue until the expiration of "twelve months" notice to be given after the 1st day of August 1855.—*Morning Herald.*

**Funeral of the Poet Campbell.**—The remains of Thomas Campbell, the author of the Pleasures of Hope, and other poems, were interred on Wednesday, in Poets' Corner, Westminster Abbey. The pall was supported by Sir Robert Peel, Lord Aberdeen, the Duke of Argyll, Lord Leigh, Lord D. C. Stuart, Lord Brougham, Lord Morpeth, and Lord Campbell. The funeral service for the poet was read in a most impressive manner by the Rev. Mr. Hillman. The funeral was considered to be a private one, but a great number of noblemen and gentlemen, friends of the deceased, were present, to testify their respect to his memory.

**A Modern Amazon.**—The following adventure, says the Reform, "will cause a thrill in the hearts of our horsemen of the Olympic circus."—Towards the middle of last month, in the neighborhood of Ak Hys, six Zeybecki attacked three or four persons from who were proceeding from Constantinople to Smyrna. The robbers having attempted to commit violence on Mademoiselle Romani, she seized a yatagan from one of the Zeybecki, whom she killed with her own hand, and put the others to flight. Mademoiselle Romani was wounded in the arm.

**SPAIN.**

The Madrid Gazette of the 1st inst. contains the following summary of the executions in only one district of Catalonia:—

"Between the 1st of February and the 15th of June, the 'facinos' in the Maresme have sustained the following losses:—Killed on the field of battle, 54 men; shot after being made prisoners 129 men; pardoned, for various reasons 107. Among the prisoners shot are the chiefs El Serrador, Viscaro, Lauva; and Tazo; Marshal and his lieutenant, Pitaron, Cotarro and his second, Martinez El Serrano, Tarancquez, and Galo de Santa Olean; and 25 generals or officers, including one colonel one commandant, three captains and thirteen lieutenants. Since the 24th of May, 14 spies, and 19 officers, coming from France, and a certain number of doctors who had joined the bands have been shot. General Don Juan de Villalonga has, by his energetic activity, not a little contributed to this result."

The Madrid journal still abounds with rumours of conspiracies, which are said to be in active preparation at Saragossa, Barcelona, and the capital. It is suspected, however, that reports are raised for political purposes, to terrify the timid. It was believed that the Government had resolved to dissolve the Cortes forthwith.

Private letters from Madrid to the 4th inst. mention as a report that the Marquis de Villuna was to resume his post as Ambassador to London. It was believed that M. de Laigori, Count de Vista Hermosa, Under Secretary of State for the War Department would be appointed Minister of War.

Seditious cries of "Long live Expatriate Death to tyrants!" had been raised at Murcia on the 29th ult. by about twenty persons, of whom four were arrested.

The following is an extract from a letter dated Barcelona, the 1st inst.—"It is certain that a decree will be published on the 10th inst. dissolving the new Cortes, and as settling new Chambers for the 10th of October; and that in the same decree the Government will make known its system of Government."

**PORTUGAL.**

The estimates usually presented to the Cortes, at this period of the year (the Chambers being dispensed with) are laid before the public. The expenditure of the Treasury for the future fiscal year, beginning the 14th inst., is estimated at 8,148,000,000.

The receipts of the Treasury for the last year are estimated at 7,520 leaving a deficit of 641,000,000, less by donations of their Majesty, 87.

**GREECE.**

The Russian Government has at length acknowledged the constitutional government in Greece. The despatch, however, to the Russian charge d'affaires in that country prescribes certain things which the Greeks must not do—a good deal in the style of a monarch addressing a conquered province.—To the (the Greeks) must not, says the despatch, think of intruding on the territorial limits assigned them; and they must be on

their guard at any attempt at conquest or spirit of Propaganda. Perhaps these restrictions on the part of Russia are not injudicious, for the Greeks, it is clear, are not very far advanced in their notions of political or even civil rights.

The latest accounts from Athens describe Greece as on the eve of another party strife. Some rioting had taken place in the capital, and "Viva the Constitution," were vociferated under the king's windows. An affray followed, in which two persons were killed. The elections were nearly over. In Messenia, five individuals lost their lives in an electioneering broil.

**NOVA SCOTIA.**

**Executive Vacancies.**—We cut the following from the *Morning Chronicle*, of Saturday. It gives a plain account than has yet appeared, of the proposals recently made for filling the vacancies in the Council.—*Times.*

"Five Letters were written by the Provincial Secretary to James B. Uniacke, James McNab, Herbert Hamilton, George Dixon, and Benjamin Smith, Esquires, offering seats in Council to each of them, respectively. The Governor stating to each that he had offered seats to the others—that he intended to appoint another Catholic, and he hoped this offer would be taken as an earnest desire to do justice to all parties. Each letter contained his Excellency's regrets that he could not, for reasons known to the public, offer a seat to Mr. Howe; which reasons were subsequently ascertained to be, the high office of Attorney General and his Excellency and his advisers in the 'newspaper press.' A similar offer was subsequently made to the Hon. Michael Tobin. All these gentlemen declined the proffered honour, some of them promptly, and others, after consultation with their political friends, at a meeting held early in the session."

"At a meeting of the Liberal Members of the House, held during the Session, Mr. Uniacke was empowered to express their decided determination to have nothing to do with any arrangement which contemplated an increase of the number of the Council. To accept on behalf of the Opposition, any proposition which gave the Liberals their due influence in a fair Coalition, with the restriction of the three officers they held in the Council. If these terms were refused, the party determined to hold their present position, and take their chance at the ensuing Election."

The following resolution was brought before the Assembly an hour before its prorogation, by Mr. Howe, seconded by Mr. Hamilton. We shall have a little more to say upon the subject next week.

Whereas, the Executive Council, has been during two entire Legislative Sessions, imperfect and incomplete;—and, whereas, an important legal office has been vacant for six months, to the great detriment of the public service.

Therefore, Resolved, that the people of Nova Scotia, are entitled to have a full Council, responsible to this Assembly, surrounding the Queen's Representative, that he may have the benefit of their advice in the exercise of the Royal Prerogative;—and, this House, deem it their duty to declare, that the Council, as at present constituted, does not enjoy the confidence of this Assembly.

During the session, of the Nova-Scotia Assembly, one day was spent by the House in debating upon the liberty of the Press. In the course of the debate, Mr. Howe made the following remark, which exhibits much sound sense as well as fertility of imagination:—

"I rather think, the remark of the honorable member for Yarmouth the other day was a very true one—that there were only three privileged classes in the State—the conductors of the Press—members of the House, and Lawyers; for these can say pretty much what they please. But let not members be too hypocritical with respect to the Press. The same wind which lashes the ocean into fury, and engulfs some frail bark in its mighty waters, also whisks thousands to our shores freighted with the rich productions of earth's fairest regions—the sun which duly scorches the lady's cheek, brings forth the flowers and fruits of the earth, and makes the heart of man rejoice with the luxurious bounty of nature that seems on every side to surround him. I believe what our old Speaker (the present Master of the Rolls) used to say is true enough—that you might just as well touch a hedgehog as a printer, and that those who do not let the press alone generally get the worst of it."

**WEST INDIES.**—Advice from Jamaica to the 10th July, and from other Islands to the 17th, show that great excitement exists with reference to the action of the British Parliament upon the Sugar duties. In the first named Island almost every parish had held public meetings, deprecating the consequences of the alteration—even the black population have held numerous meetings. The feeling does not appear so intense in other Islands, but is still ardently evinced.
