

WEAKER TONE IN GRAIN MARKETS

Unexpectedly Large World Shipments of Wheat Exercised Depressing Influence.

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—World shipments larger than expected had a depressing effect today in wheat. There was a transient rally, but the market closed at a range varying from 1/2c net to 1/2c net in an advance of a shade. Corn finished with a loss of 1/2c to 1/2c net. In previous transactions, the market was irregular, strung out from 10c off to 1 1/2c up.

RADICAL CHANGES ARE RECOMMENDED.

City Auditor Sterling Would Prevent Delay in Tax Collections. ONE CHIEF COLLECTOR Should Have Charge of All Employees in That Department.

City Auditor Sterling was asked by the city council to investigate the cause of the delay in the collection of the employees of the city council, and to recommend such changes as would prevent delay in the future.

He advocates putting all the collectors under a head collector, who will be attached to the treasury department and have full control of all appointed dates, there would be no doubt as to the rolls being returned promptly. All arrears would then be turned over to arrears of taxes department.

Two instalments. He recommends that taxes be paid in two instalments, that there be no discounts, and that interest be charged on arrears. He holds that to carry out this plan the estimates would have to be made up and the rate struck early in each year. He suggests that the head collector could work out a plan to put the changes into effect.

Auditor Sterling notes that the collectors excuse delay in return of the rolls by the need for more assistance. Also that the collectors are governed by the city council, and not by the treasurer. He corrects the general impression that the collectors deposit collections in their own names in the banks. The collections are deposited to the credit of the city.

This recommended reorganization of the tax collecting department will not doubt be discussed in a conference. If it is eventually approved by the city council it will make tax collecting as sure a thing as are the taxes themselves.

MAY AFFECT G.T.P. WORK.

Placer Stamped Near Telkwa, B.C. is Causing Anxiety. VANCOUVER, B.C. Sept. 15.—(Can. Press.)—A dispatch last night from Telkwa, where there has been a stamped to a new placer find 110 miles southeast of Telkwa, expresses the fear that it may seriously affect construction on the G.T.P., as there are 5000 men now employed within a radius of 125 miles of the new find. A lack of provisions for men in the field is causing anxiety, as every pack horse is on the trail.

ATLANTIC COMPANIES' WAR.

Canada May Benefit as Result of Quarrel Over Emigrant Traffic. OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The Atlantic steamship war is dealt with in a report of the trade and commerce department today. In all probability, the result of the quarrel that has broken out between the North German Lloyd and the Hamburg American lines with regard to the division of the North Atlantic emigrant passenger traffic will be to provide this fall additional facilities for the transportation of Canadian produce to German ports via Boston and Baltimore at low rates.

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




