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## PROTECT CONDUCTORS FROM GREAT DANGER

Time Arrived for Action in Elimination of Running Boards, Says Ald. Gibbons.

"After an accident occurred May 24, 1914, thru which an employee of the Toronto Street Railway was killed I interviewed Chairman McIntyre in reference to the doing away with the running board on the street cars, as the use of the running board was so tributed to the man's death," said Ald. Joe Gibbons, business agent of the street railway employees in an interview yesterday. "Mr. McIntyre expressed the opinion that the running board should be done away with," he continued. "Now he says that the company has been building convertible cars since 1903 and no objection has been raised. The only reason that I give for Mr. McIntyre making such a statement is that he has only been a resident of Toronto for a short time and is not familiar with the efforts put forward by the street railway employees to have the running board removed."

"In 1903 when the Ontario Railway Board Act was under consideration a committee of employees and the late James McDonald was present and the danger of the danger of the running board by photographs taken on the street showing the number of passengers on the running board. The committee in charge of the act seemed to think that the danger was due to the passengers being allowed to stand on the running board, and put a clause in the act prohibiting them doing so. I have personally interviewed the provincial cabinet every year since on this question. There is no foundation for Mr. McIntyre's statement."

"The conductors desire to obtain the elimination of the running board by peaceful means, but there have been so many accidents happening, and no definite steps taken to do away with the running board that the time has arrived for something being done to give the conductors the proper protection."
