Extract of a Speech of the Governor, at the proroguing

I cannot part with you, without expressing the great fatisfaction I have had in observing the unanimity, which you affured me of at the beginning of the session, has so fully evinced itself throughout all its proceedings.

The eafe which arifes from thence to yourfelves; the advantages which accrue to your Conftituents; and the credit which is thereby reflected upon the whole Province, will be continual motives for your preferving that equanimity and moderation which now fo happily prevail among you.
