Mrs. Skeel, no. 156, believes that a copy at M^{ons}. without title page and lacking pp. 29-30 represents an earlier issue with no title page since the title page in other copies is of a different texture of paper, pasted in, and contains Washington's acknowledgement of a copy of the pamphlet.

Mrs. Skeel states that the text is largely taken from W. L. Brown's "Essays on the Natural Equality of Men," *Philadelphia*, 1793.
