PROFIT-EARNING PUBLIC OWNER SHIP.

In consequence of the large profit earned during the past year by the municipal electric light and power undertaking of Lethbridge, Aita., the city council has been enabled to reduce the rates by 25 per cent. The new plant was instailed eighteen months or so ago at a cost of \$238,000, and the net profit for last year was over \$30 .-000, applied in reduction of taxation. This provides another example of the advantage attending commercial ownership and operation of public services. By retaining absolute control of its electric light and power franchise Lethbridge is free to reduce rates by onequarter, thus stimulating local industries and encouraging them and its own development. Had it parted with that franchise the public demand for cheaper electricity would have been in straight conflict with the demand of the shareholders of the holding conipany for higher and ever higher dividends, and consequent increase in share values


