## STORMONTER'S GENEROSITY

**L. A. Ault, Formerly of Mille Roches, Gives \$80,000 Park to Cincinnati.**  
CORNWALL, May 10.—(Special.)—L. A. Ault of the Ault-Wiberg Co. of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Toronto, and president of the board of park commissioners of Cincinnati, has presented that city with 124 acres of land, valued at \$80,000, to be used for park purposes. The property is located near the Linwood water tower, overlooking the Little Miami River, and affords an unobstructed view of the Ohio River and Ohio Valley. The only condition attached to the gift was that the city improve Principio-street, as an approach to the park, which has been named the Ault Park. Mr. Ault has notified Park Expert Keeler to let him know of other properties adapted for park purposes, as he plans to give these to the city.
