See that all hangings are taken down, brushed, aired and put away; this removes lurking places for moths. Also pack away all bric-a-brac. If left out, it will only gather dust and increase labor when the house is reopened.

Have the rooms cleaned as to floors, windows, walls and woodwork.

Above all, leave no foodstuff around; of course, dry groceries, if in cans or glass fars or in the boxes, are reasonably safe from the invasion of mice or insects, but even in the matter of these foodstuffs careful judgment must be used.

Cleaning Veivet.

To clean light colored veivet, cordurcy or felt, rub the soiled portion lightly with the cut surface of a day-old loaf of white bread, cutting off the surface as fast as it becomes discolored.

To Clean Jewelry.

Gold rings, brooches and other articles of jewelry that are set with precious stones can be cleaned with warm water and a white soap and a very little ammonia. Use a soft old tooth brush to get in between the setting and the stone. For rings set with turquoises and pearls the water cleaning should be avoided, but for the hard transparent gems it is allowed. Polish the rings and pins with a soft chamois and they will be wonderfully bright and sparkling.

Crepe Slips. The busy mother will find her laundry work decreased if she will make little princess slips of white cotton crepe, to serve as corset cover and inside skirt. These crepe combinations trimmed with torchon lace are very pretty and need no ironing, thus enabling one to change as often as desired without involving extra work on ironing day.

Dainty Collar.

To wear with colored linen dresses, a sailor collar of sheerest mull is most effective. It requires a half yard of material. After cutting the collar out, finish the edge with an inch-wide frill of finely plaited net. Cuffs to match may be made with rounded or square corners and edged with the plaited net. If a touch of color is desired, a row of featherstitching where the net is joined to the collar supplies it.

"Anyone wishing to buy their strawberries for preserving will be unwise
to delay any longer," said a wholesale
fruit dealer to The World at the Toronto friut market, Yonge-street, yesterday afternoon. "Altho the berries
are now the most plentiful they have
been this season, from now on they
will grow scarcer and in a week or
ten days' time they will be off the
market for good. Their place will be
taken by raspberries, which, with the
present hot weather, are coming on
fine, and following the going out of
the strawberries, in about a week's
time will be plentiful."

eight carloads arrived. Five of the

California peaches began coming in yesterday, but are selling at a lower price than the Georgia peach because of their smaller size. They are somewhat greener than the Georgia peach and as a result do not spoil on the dealers' hands like the others. California peaches \$2.50.

A novelty put on the market yesterday were California peaches in quart cardboard boxes. These sold at the tate of 25c a box and were in good demand.

wean a baby during the summer months. The digestive organs are as a rule in better condition during the cool weather, and better able to adjust themselves, to this important change. If, however, a baby is steadily losing in weight and is evident'y not thriv-ing on his mother's milk it is best to wean him even in summer. Sometimes partially weaning him is quite sufficient for some time, and that is far better than weaning him entirely. Most babies should be weaned at 9 or 10 months, for very few mothers can nourish their children well after that time. Never wean a baby suddenly. The old method of changing the method of feeding was little short of cruelty.

If you have followed the advice given in this column your baby is quite used to a bottle, because he has taken boiled water from one several times a day. And when he was two or three months old, or even younger, you started giving him one bottle of modified milk a day—in that way getting a fest yourself and paving the way for easy weaning. Your baby is now accus-tomed to cow's milk, and if you should

tomed to cow's milk, and if you should have to put him on it entirely, even now there would be little difficulty in accomplishing the change.

Many bables who have been fed exclusively from the breast until they are three or four months old, will not touch a rubber nipple, and if sudden weaning is necessary, there is often great trouble in nourishing the child. All this difficulty and danger is done away with if the baby is used to a bottle from the start.
