FAMILY TREE OF JACK DEMPSEY

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 23.—"I am neither a Jew, Pole or Slavonian—just plain American," said Jack Dempsey here yesterday, in a statement following the Reister-Dempsey headcase.

"I have never told anyone this story before, because I never wanted to tell anyone, and because I don't think the folks back home in Virginia and Kentucky would be very glad to hear of it, but I think I can claim origin from some of the proudest blood in America—I mean the one West Virginia and Kentucky mountaineers.

"Back in 1882 the country was electrified by the McCoy-Hatfield feud in West Virginia, and that feud cut close to twenty lives among my immediate relatives. Also it caused my father and mother to move west.

"I am a descendant of the McCoy and Hatfields. My father, Davidson Dempsey, is a relative of the Hatfields, and a severe, cousin Wallace Hatfield of West Virginia, while my mother, Cecilia Smoot, was related to the McCoy.

"If I am a descendant of the Hatfields, after which I will go to West Virginia to visit some of my relatives and to look up a claim in a county which my father believes belongs to him."
