

## HE DENOUNCED MALTARISM

Speaker at Baptist Church Association Meeting Says This Spirit is to Be Deplored

## AND WARM DISCUSSION ENSUED.

Opinion of the Gathering Did Not Coincide With That of the Gentleman.

The second and last day of the meetings of the Toronto Association of Baptist churches opened yesterday morning in the Baptist Church at East Toronto, with a large attendance. The entire morning was taken up with a session of the Women's Mission Circle. After the transaction of business, and discussion on anti-militarism, several papers were read. A paper on Moulton by Mrs. Henderson, and one on New Ontario, by Mrs. Brecken, were very well handled. Miss Priest, who has recently returned from the Yagu tribe, spoke very helpfully of mission work in that field. A solo by Mrs. Dingman was well received.

In the afternoon, the church work among boys and girls was the discussion which opened the afternoon session. This theme was ably handled by H. G. Hawkins, who described the various agencies of church work among the young. The speaker, who described in some respects it was all right, but as for instructing the boys as a military body he was not in favor of it. He, with a number of others, denounced the spirit of militarism which was prevalent throughout the country at the present time. Other speakers followed with words of praise for the same spirit. In speaking of the best way to get the young to attend church, he quoted an old adage, "If you want a lamb to go in a certain direction, you must drive the old sheep ahead of it." This drive the old sheep ahead of it. The speaker said that the presence was necessary to get a good attendance of the young.

## Church and Young Men.

Rev. G. T. Webb, speaking of the work of the church among the young men and women, raised a voice of warning against the dangers that beset the young people of the city. This topic was discussed at some length by several others.

The warmest discussion of the afternoon was that on systematic giving. Rev. C. W. King introduced this subject, and made a strong plea for the giving of one-tenth to the church. Passages of scripture were given in support of his argument. He was backed up by several other speakers. Rev. G. T. Webb, Mr. Hightington and others were opposed to this scheme, and said that it was not in accordance with the Christian standard to give one-tenth.

The prayer meeting was ably discussed by Rev. E. Hooper, M.D. He claimed that, in most cases, the pastor had too much to say, when the meetings should be left in the hands of the members. Dr. Hooper's remarks were endorsed by all the speakers.

## Resolutions Passed.

Resolutions were passed endorsing the Baptist Room. A resolution of condolence was passed on the death of John Alexander, son of John and Mary Alexander.

The question of introducing sectarian religion into the public schools was discussed in strong language. The resolution was passed: Resolved, that in view of certain attempts which have recently been made to secure sectarian religion in the public schools, the Toronto Association of Baptist churches is of the opinion that it is expedient to reaffirm our historic position, looking to the direction of public schools in the interests of the propagation of denominational religion.

Bethel Church, King City, extended an invitation to the association to meet there at its next session, which will be held next summer. The invitation was accepted.

## In the Evening.

At the evening session, Rev. C. J. Campbell, B.A., discussed the question of home missions. Rev. J. B. Thompson, B.A., discussed foreign missions and L. A. McCrimmon, M.A., handled the question of education. Heated discussions were in order all evening. During the evening the choir of the Collegiate Church, Toronto, rendered several selections, which were well received. A vote of thanks was tendered the pastor and members of the Bethel Church, who had taken every care to make the meeting of the association a success.

## APPLE YIELD SURE TO BE LIGHT, BUT ALL GRAINS PROMISE WELL

Interviews With Men on the Cattle Market, Covering the Larger Part of the Province—Peas Have Been Affected by the Wet Weather.

Few men have more opportunities for the acquisition of practical information regarding the general standing of the agricultural community than the men who are to-day engaged in the collection and shipment of cattle for both foreign and domestic purposes. In other words, the drovers and the cattlemen who from time to time make visits to various parts of the country are naturally in a position to speak intelligently and with authority upon all matters affecting the community whence their trade is derived. With a view to acquiring this practical information, fresh from the fountain-head, a representative of The World visited the Western Cattle Mart, held yesterday, and was accorded the privilege of personal interviews with a number of representative drovers.

Henry Heel, Perth County, reports the hay crop in that district as fairly good, but wheat and oats a good average crop, and fall wheat alone the average. Spring wheat also bears evidence of good returns.

Thomas Bovey, South Victoria, reports old meadows in that county as good, while new meadows were never better; barley and oats good, while peas, in some low-lying districts, owing to the excessive moisture, are somewhat injured. Alfalfa is looking splendid, and well-headed.

J. H. Carnegie, M.L.A., East Victoria, stated that, while the crop of alfalfa was good, fall wheat, where not winter-killed, is looking splendid, and well-headed.
