ASK FOR BOUNTY OR TARIFF

Promotors of the Beet Sugar Industry in Ontario Have Deputation in Ottawa.

THE MINISTER PROMISES NO RELIEF

Prominent Men From Different Cen tres Express Their Views in

Ottawa, March 26.-The fight of the beet ry commenced to-day, thru a deputation of 100 prominent men from the different t ntres of Ontario. They called upon the Minister of Finance this morning and ask- ping easy in our line for Saturday, ed that countervailing duties be imposed ipon bounty beet sugar from Europe and elsewhere, and that protection be afforded to Canadian sugar either in the form of an increase of duty or a bonus.

Plea for Sugar Beets.
Mr. A. Campbell, M.P., introduced the deputation, and Mr. Hugh Blain, president of the Ontario Beet Sugar Company, made an able presentation of the case from the manufacturers' standpoint. He said that before his company went into the business they made an investigation of the existing pocket, regular price \$6.00, \$3.69 conditions, but they were not quite aware of the peculiar conditions resulting from tries. He quoted from a statement made in the Imperial House of Cemmons by Mr. Gerald Baltour, in moving the adoption of the policy embodied in the resolutions of the Brussels conference. Mr. Baltour showed that the price of sugar per cwt, on the Loudon market had drepped from 20 shillings in 1882 to 6 shillings last september, which was about 30 per cent. less than if lost to produce and bring the sugar from termany and the West indies.

Raising beets was a good way of keeping down weeds on the farm. He had 32 head of cattle, and fed them on beet pulp and chaft. Some of the strek had gained from 250 to 300 lbs.


