Against the Accused

Gen. Roget an Eloquent Adversary of Dreyfus.

"Crime Syndicate" Said to Have Decried the Captain's Death.

Meeting of the Emperors of Russia, Germany and Austria.

France Has Snatched the Island of San Chau.

Egypt's Cotton Crop Imperiled—Successful Wireless Telegraph Experiments.

London, Aug. 17.—The Rennes correspondent of the Times, describing the proceedings of the court-martial yesterday, says: Gen. Roget has proved a most influential and eloquent adversary of Dreyfus. For two hours, with singular ease, and in effective rhetorical and dramatic style, he held the attention of the judges, interesting them by his rare conversational powers, and surprising them by the insidious and wicked suggestiveness of his methods. Unlike his predecessors, Roget had steeled himself to meet the steady gaze of Dreyfus. His manner in this regard was startling and dramatic. Evidently he was trying to provoke the accused, and wanted a scene in court. Dreyfus was frequently on the point of replying, but Maitre Demange held him back.

IN LABORER'S PLACE.
It is reported from Rennes that Captain Dreyfus has asked to have Maitre Monard, his wife's advocate, to replace Maitre Labori during the convalescence of the latter.
Dr. Paul Reclus says that Maitre Labori was weaker yesterday than he was on the 14th. The physicians have not as yet extracted the bullet, and they do not believe that Labori can attend court Monday. They say that it would be an act of great imprudence if he were to do so.

PLUCKY AND CHERFUL.
M. Matthew Dreyfus, brother of Captain Dreyfus, visited Labori yesterday morning. Finding him to be progressing favorably, M. Dreyfus said: "Well, man, brave! The revolver does not seem to have done you much harm."
"Oh," replied M. Labori, smiling, "revolvers are no use against me. I am too big. It needs a cannon to do me much harm."
This is a striking illustration of M. Labori's pluck and cheerfulness in spite of the agony he is undergoing. The premier, M. Waldeck-Rousseau, has telegraphed to the sufferer, expressing his sympathy and expressing hopes of his recovery.

"CRIME SYNDICATE" AT WORK.
Joseph Reinach cables: "The shooting of Labori will warm up the atmosphere of the court, as it has disgusted honest men. The attempted assassination is not the outcome of a weak mind; it is part of a general plan, is premeditated and is a crime. The crime syndicate feared Labori and wanted his life and his documents. The same men are responsible for the razor which cut Henry's throat, for the rope which hung Loeunier, and the pistol that shot Labori. History furnishes no example of crime so atrocious. The plot includes the murder of Dreyfus if acquitted."
The army accusers are now in full retreat, and hoping for revolution. There have been several combinations made to murder Dreyfus. The murderer has many accomplices. The plot has a platform of two planks: first, the conviction of the republic; second, the murder of those who denounce the gang of forgers. Labori's blood stirs honest souls. Look forward to a speedy acquittal of Dreyfus."
The decision of Col. Jouaust not to adjourn the trial has created a very bad impression in Dreyfusard circles, and pessimistic opinions are being made as to the outcome of the trial. It is pointed out that the decision of the court is a blow to the republic, and shows that not one of the judges is well disposed towards the prisoner. Emile Zola has telegraphed to M. Labori, saying: "On learning of the outrage I send you the expression of my indignation. My heart is full of tenderness and admiration for you."

MEETING OF EMPERORS.
London, Aug. 17.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Telegram says: "Early in October the Emperors of Russia, Germany and Austria will meet at Skienicwie, in Poland, where the czar has arranged a hunt on a grand scale. The foreign and war ministers of Russia will attend Emperor Nicholas, and it is expected that grave political matters will be discussed."

FRANCE GRABS AN ISLAND.
Hong Kong, Aug. 17.—A newspaper published in Macao, the Portuguese seaport at the southwest entrance of the Canton River, reports that France has occupied the Island of San Chau, west of Macao, as an assertion of her right to the Province of Kwang Tung in the event of the partition of China. A great commotion has been caused in Hong Kong by the report. If true, this will cause a breach with England, whose interests will be gravely menaced by such occupation, San Chau being the main base of the Chinese trade from the West River.

COTTON CROPS THREATENED.
Cairo, Egypt, Aug. 17.—The extreme lowness of the Nile threatens the cotton crops, and the natives have been warned to sow early. The upper highlands will suffer the most, and it is feared that the loss of revenue will be considerable.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY SUCCESSFUL.
London, Aug. 17.—Signor Marconi, in his experiments with wireless telegraphy at Dover yesterday, made a complete success, the messages passing through several miles of cliffs, upon which Dover Castle stands, and twelve miles across the sea.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 17.—Wesley McCauley, a two-year-old child, was drowned in the Gatineau River on Tuesday, at Kirk's Ferry.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 17.—Engineer Fairbairn, of Chapeau, was killed on the C. P. R. yesterday morning in a collision between the Imperial Limited and a Chinese special.

DRANK DYE.
Ottawa, Aug. 17.—The 18-month-old grandchild of John Logan, St. George street, took a quantity of dye. The prompt action of Mrs. Logan in giving the child milk and an emetic probably saved the little one's life.

DEAD UNDER A ROLLER.
Barrie, Aug. 17.—On Wednesday a boy named Hurst was driving a team and roller in a field in Innisfil township. He was riding on the implement at that time, and when going down a slope fell forward. He was found dead beneath the roller, which was resting on the hollow of his neck.

KILLED BY A FALLING TREE.
