
Demand Not Universal.

The women of England had fought strenuously for the franchise, while their sisters in France, just across the channel, had made no such effort. The matter was largely a matter of social and domestic conditions. Last session the Legislature of Ontarlo had unanimously granted the franchise to women, but had declined to make women eligible for membership in the Legislature. Nova Scotia had rejected the female franchise which Ontario had adopted. Quebec had not given the women the franchise, because they had not asked it; did not desire it; in fact, many of them were opposed to it.
