THE WAR SITUATION

[By the Associated Press.] Allied forces this morning began a eneral attack against the German ine running from Chaulnes south to the Olse River, a front of about 25 miles. Dispatches filed at London shortly after noon reported important gains at various points, especially on the vital sector south of Las-

signy, near the Oise. The Lassigny massif, the steep slopes of which have been strongly defended by the Germans, is report-ed to be almost within the grasp of the French, the unofficial dispatches state that there is every prospect that this natural fortress will soon be wrested from the Germans.

Further south the French have advanced to the village of L'Econvillon, just south of the eastern exmity of Thiescourt Wood and Virtually on the crest of the hills overing long reaches of the Olse. Just to the west of L'Econvillon the French have made new progress north of the St. Cloud Farm. Germans Abandon Trenches. As an immediate result of gains made in that sector, the Ger-

mans are abandoning their trenches in the bed of the Oise just west of the village of Ballly, east of Ribecourt. It is said that the French have occupied these positions. North of Lassigny In the region of Roye and along the railroad running northward to Chaulnes, there are, so far, no reports of progress. If the Allies succeed in carrying the heights south of Lassigny they will force the enemy to retire from the Roye district, as they will have the Roye-Noyon road under their fire and will dominate the whole region with their artillery. The advance reported during the last few hours would, if continued, probably have an effect on the German positions in the Ourscamp and Carlepont forests, east of the Oise. If the Germans there are outflanked by the allied movements, a retirement from that district would be probable, and this would necessitate a retraction of the line running from the Oise and the Aisne at Soissons. Thus the attack launched this morning would appear to have a direct relation to the battle being fought along the

Aisne and Vesle by the Allies. Fighting Around Fismette. Late dispatches tell of hard fighting at Fismette, on the north bank of the Vesle between Soissons and Rheims. The Allies were forced from counter-attack is reported to have restored the allied position on the north side of the river.

From Chaulnes northward to the Ancre River the Allies appear to have been held up by the desperate German defence. There have been local engagements along this line, but at no point have the British and Americans engaged on this front succeeded in making any marked Impression upon the German lines, which are virtually resting on the old trench systems held by the enemy In 1916.

Reports received this morning stated that the ruins of Peronne are n flames and that several villages behind the German lines are burn ing. The fires may have been caused by allied bombardments, but it is believed the Germans applied the torch to these towns as a prelimin ary step to further retirement east-Nothing of significance has occur-

red in the Flanders sector during the past day.

the past day.

Allied troops are hitting the strengthened German line from the Ancre to the Olse for important local gains at various points in preparation for further advances. The Germans are making every effort to hold the Brit'sh, French and Americans in check in their old lines of the winter of 1916-17.

A break in the German effort to stabilize the positions appears most probable in the region of Lassigny, between Roye and Noyon. Here the French have taken Gury, two miles southeast of Lassigny, and are pushing forward into the southern edges of Thiescourt Wood and the important high ground to the south of Lassigny. West of the town the French have taken Des Loges. From Gury the French are in position to outflank the hill position south of Lassigny. Lassigny.

Northwest of Roye the British have pushed eastward from Fouhave pushed eastward from Fou-quescourt, one mile west of the Chaulnes-Roye railroad. A deeper penetration here will place both Chaulnes and Roye in danger. This movement and the French operation around Lassigny place the right and centre of Gen, von Hutler's army in a more or less serious predicament, which probably will pressite a which probably will necessitate a further withdrawal by him, as two of his three bases are insecure. The fall of Lassigny would place the French between Roye and Noyon, and in position to outflank both.

British Advance.
Along the Somme the British have ushed forward slightly toward eronne. North of the river, Brit-Peronne. North of the river, British and American troops are fighting in the suburbs of Bray, while on the south the British have taken Proyart, four miles south of Bray. West of Chaulnes heavy fighting continues in the region of Lihons. At some points, especially in the centre of the battle front, the allied heavy artillery has been brought up and is shelling the enemy positions west of the Somme, south of Peronne, heavily. The French also are rushing up guns to break the enemy resistance between Roye and Noyon. The Germans here have The Germans here have depended upon artillery barrages to stop allied attacks.

Aerial Engagements.
British, French and American bombers and airmen are harassing the rear of the enemy positions unceasingly. During Sunday 107 tons of bombs were dropped on railway junctions, concentration points and other important targets in the other important targets in the enemy area. In aerial fighting the allied airmen destroyed 44 German machines and put 45 others out of action. Berlin reports the bringing down of 17 allied airplanes. Frankfort, which is east of the Rhine, and Metz have been bombed by

and Metz have been bombed by British squadrons.
North of the Vesle, from Fismes, the Germans continue their efforts to dislodge the French and American troops. Two violent counterattacks were carried out by the enemy on Monday, but both were thrown back by the Franco-Americans. On the remainder of the front in

France there has been no activity. In Italy the situation is without change, moderate artillery firing and change, moderate artillery firing and patrol actions only being in progress.

GERMANS INTEND TO OCCUPY PETROGRAD
