New York, July 12.—Many further indications of general improvement in important lines of trade and industry, in addition to normal peace demands, gave fresh impetus to the trading on the stock exchange this week, the advance, however, being sheeked at one period by renewed strength in the money period by renewed strength in the money market. Call loans mounted to 17 per cent, and as much as 20 per cent was said to have been paid in isolated cases, but normal rates were soon restored, although banks and other financial institutions issued further warning against excessive speculation. Dealings covered the widespread range of any period since the second stage of the bull market, encompassing many issues hitherto neglected or unknown to the senmarket. Call loans mounted to 17 pe erto neglected or unknown to the gen-eral stock list, but the bulk of the trading again concentrated in such favorites as oils, motors and allied

Rails, especially reorganized or low-oriced stocks, experienced a revival of mand extending to dormant issues of mand extending to dormant issues of the western and southern systems. High grade rails were firm, but only moderately active at best.

Noteworthy factors in the industrial situation included United States Steel's favorable tonnage report for June, and the strength of coppers, which was concurrent with several advances in the


