THREE SCHOOL PLAN ADOPTED AFTER BATTLE

Board of Education Assured Department Behind Solution of Collegiate Problem.

As a result of a long and wordy meeting of the board of education held Tuesday afternoon, three separate high chools situated in the north, south and east ends of the city in all probability will be built, London, thereby finding a solution of one of the most vexing problems ever to face a local board of education. With the adoption of this educational building program the original plan for a 26-room central to be erected on the former site Collegiate Institute will be dis-

This decision was reached by the This decision was reached by the board after many arguments and a long discussion in which every member took part, and despite a bitter fight put up by Trustees Edwin Smith, A. N. Udy and John Eggett, who favored the central school plan, with feeders in the outlying districts. It was the direct outcome of a visit of a deputation from No. 3 committee of the board to the department of education in Toronto, where the matter was thoroughly discussed.

It was also decided that the most feasible site for the north end school, which is to be built first, and completely care for the immediate needs of the city, would be the Beck property at Richmond and St. James streets, which was recently offered for sale to the school board. With this in view, No. 3 committee was given full power to take steps to immediately secure the property. The objection of Edwin Smith, who thought that the citizens should first be given a vote on it, was overruled.

Strong Favor.

The committee also reported that the department of education looked with strong favor on the Beck property as a school site. It was not doing this because the property belonged to Sir Adam Beck, but because the department deemed it an ideal school site.

Mr. Rowe and Mr. Coleridge, speaking on the interview with the department, said that the minister of education had stated that if the city intended to go ahead with the plans for a 26-room school the department could not guarantee the debentures. This, in itself, the speakers said, was sufficient to make the board abandon the central school idea.

Furthermore, the department pointed out the unwieldiness of the large schools, where it was impossible to keep in personal touch with the pupils. It was stated that trouble would be It was stated that trouble would be experienced to get pupils to go to the smaller schools while a large central one was in the city, for they would get the idea that the smaller ones were not efficient.

Mrs. Tanner moved that Miss Upshall who has been teaching in the public schools for a number of years, should be given the preference as a reward for faithfull work, but her motion was lost. was not doing the fair thing, and that its actions was no encouragement to teachers who wished to benefit themselves. Mr. Coleridge opposed the appointment of Miss Upshall on the grounds that she was more valuable where she is.

A dispute arose between No. 1 and No. 3 committees over the rental of the Princess avenue school and certain public schools used by the Collegiate institute. As Mr. Coleridge thought the charges were much too high they were referred back to the committee.

Inspector C. B. Edwards, in making his report for October, stated that the general attendance for the public school averaged 297 more than for the corresponding month of last year. He reported that there were seven cases of mumps and seven cases of diphtheria among the pupils during the month. There were also three cases of chickenpox and two of scarlet fever.

Mr. Edwards recommended the making some provision for the establishment of school rinks.

Mr. Mooney reported that there was a decrease in the total attendance of all classes during the past month compared to the corresponding month of last year.

A deputation from the teachers of the collegiate institute waited on the board to urge that the maximum of the salaries be raised to the following amounts: Heads of departments, \$3,350 assistants, \$2,250. This was to be brought about by an increase in salaries of \$250 the coming year and \$150 each year following. The matter was laid ever to No. 3 committee.

The board passed a resolution, extending sympathy to the mother of the late Miss Josephine Jeffery, who was a teacher in the St. George's school, prior to her death during last month.


