A Wise Policy.

Brindell Released On \$100,-000 Bond-Held On Three Counts.

NEW YORK. Nov. 17. - Robert P. Brindell, president of the Building Trades Council, was this afternoon indicted by the additional grand jury investigating New York's alleged building trust on evidence supplied by the joint legislative committee. The indictment, which contains three

counts, charges him with attempting to extort \$7,500 from a house wreckto extort \$7,500 from a house wrecking firm and he is alleged to have threatened to call a strike of the firm's men unless the money was paid over to him. Brindell was arraigned in the general sessions court, and ball was set at \$100,000. Unable to furnish this bail, he was made a prisoner in the criminal courts building, despite the protests of his counsel.

Special Assistant District Attorney Richter in his appeal to the court for heavy bail declared that collective extortion charges against Brindell would aggregate \$1.000,000.

Later counsel for Brindell arranged with a surety company to furnish the with a surety company to furnish the \$100,000 bond, and the labor leader was released.

FINANCING CROP HAS ADDED \$17,000,000 TO NOTE CIRCULATION

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—(By the Canadian Press).—Financing the crop movement has within the last four weeks increased the amount of Dominion notes in circulation by nearly \$17,003,000. At the same time, the amount of gold held remains practically unchanged. During the four-week period, however, approved securities deposited against Pominion notes has increased by rather more than the increase in circulation. Thus the total backing of Dominion notes in circulation, gold and securities combined, bears practically the same ratio to the circulation as it bore a month ago.

ratio to the circulation as it both a month ago.

Since the outbreak of war, Dominion note circulation has expanded enormously. On March 31, 1914, it was \$117,795,718, and the gold held by the Government as security for the notes totafied \$96,161,366, or more than the gold held today for a circulation of \$220,000,000.

As the necessities of war financing accumulated, so the circulation of Dominion notes expanded until it reached a peak of \$337,319,309 in November, 1918. There has since been a decline in circulation, although there has beer little change in recent months in the ratio of gold to circulation.

ATHENS, Nov. 16 .- George Rhallis, who has formed a ministry to take the place of that of Premier Venizelos, which resigned as a result of its defeat in the elections held last Sunday, always has been opposed to the politics of M. Venizelos. He also is known to be opposed to former King Constantine. Regarding Constantine, M. Rhallis said

"It is possible that Constantine may return to power. In this connection the Allies should remember that he is more pro-Greek than pro-German. He also is something of a militarist."

The city of Athens was quiet during the day. Most of the stores were closed, and those that remained open had their iron shutters ready to be dropped instantly in case of necessity. Troops continued to patrol the city, although both political parties instructed their adherents to keep the peace. Machine-guns were mounted on peace. Machine-guns were mounted on Parliament House, and there also was battery on Lucabetus Hill.

M. Giparis, chief of the Venizelist detectives, was shot by an infantry colonel when he demanded more troops. ISSUES RESIGNATION.

ATHENS, Nov. 17.—The resignation of Premier Venizelos has been made public. The majority leaders speak of the restoration of former King Constantine as an accomplished fact.

CONSTANTINE WILL WAIT FOR PLEBISCITE

LUCERNE, Switzerland, Nov. 17.— Former King Constantine made his first pronouncement respecting his attitude in the light of the Greek elections to the Associated Press today.

"I cannot go to Athens at the head of any one political party, and therefore I insist upon a plebiscite for my return or the return of one of my sons," he declared. "It is for the Greek people to decide. If the Greek people want me I shall return to Athens unless of he declared. "It is for the Greek people to decide.
