SOLDIERS GET PRIZES.

Trophies Awarded in England Distributed to Winners at Armistice.

Staff-Sergeant Bayles of the Grenadiers had the proud honor of receiving the Imperial Tobacco Co.'s trophy, emblematic of the highest aggregate score made at Blisley, England, from the hands of Sir Mortimer Clark at the armistice last night. The cup is a massive solid silver affair and the third most coveted trophy of all those shot for it at the English range.

Sergeant Bayles has earned the trophy, too, for this was the 12th trip he had made to the camp.

Corporal Clark, B. Co., who won the regimental match at Long Branch, and Sergeant Kelly, who won the aggregate, were also given their cups last night. The companies winning the different cups were: D, which won the Toronto Hunt Club Cup; F, the Aldwell Cup; B, the Non-Commissioned Officers' Cup. The right half battalion won the Madison Cup.

After a muster parade of the regiment, which turned out 662 strong, the officers and guests adjourned to the officers' mess-room, where a reception was held by Col. Goodenham.

SAUER PIANO RECITAL OPENS MUSICAL SEASON

Highly Appreciative Audience List—en to Germany's Great Artist at Massey Hall.

Toronto did not avail itself as fully as it might have done last night, at Massey Hall of the opportunity to hear Emil Sauer, who is ranked with Paderewski, Hofmann and Hambourg as one of the greatest pianists of his generation.

There was a good audience, however, especially in the top gallery. The balcony was fairly filled but the ground floor looked rather bare. The audience was highly appreciative, and the perfect silence that reigned during some of the more difficult passages was one of the best evidences of the close attention paid. In point of applause the pianist could have desired no more cordial hearing.

His program was a masterpiece of three encores and very generously, giving full measure in new numbers in response. The other items were almost equally applauded.

In personality Sauer is quite as striking as his Polish rival. Everyone must have thought of Sir Wilfrid Laurier when he walked on the platform last night, and his bow, smile, the same strongly marked features and the same fluffy bunches of grey hair either side of a bald and rosy-tinted dome.

Sauer clearly enjoys his own music and threw himself into it with vigor and abandon. His left hand is a contrast to the right hand mentioned in Scripture, and did wonderful things. The power and quality immediately displayed on the opening of the Friedemann-Bach concerto and the same power was displayed in this particular number reminding one of the clanging anvils of some Hammered Dulciana.

He greeted the performance of this number, with its exquisite Largo movement. The Sonata Pathétique was encored and has never been more finely rendered in Toronto. The Chopin numbers drew a demonstration of appreciative applause, and the tenderness of Sauer's playing was very marked in the Nocturne and the musical program the music was of delightful interest, quality and Wagner was not missed after the Bach concerto.
