NORTH TORONTO WANTS YORK MILLS SERVICE

Town Would Hail Suburban Cars to North End—County and Suburban Items.

NORTH TORONTO, July 27.—(Special.)—Among townsmen generally the statements contained in The World of this morning re the inefficient service accorded the north and residents of the town were fully corroborated and in many cases amplified. The remarks of the citizens quoted were accepted as being right along the line of present conditions, and a true statement of the facts as they actually exist.

Not a little surprise was expressed to-night at the statement contained in an evening paper and attributed to Traffic Manager Livingstone, in which the latter is quoted as saying, "Up to the present we have never had a complaint of the York Mills service."

As a matter of fact, the residents north of Glen Grove, together with the council, have been trying for years to get an adequate service, and how the company could escape knowledge of the fact is a profound mystery.

Later the traffic manager further unburdened himself and said respecting the seven-cent fare: "As far as that is concerned, we are compelled by the Ontario Railway Board to charge this rate, and this makes the charge work out all right."

Chapter 30, sub-section 171, Ontario Railway Act, specifically states: (3) Notwithstanding anything contained in any agreement with any municipal or other corporation or person, or any provision contained in any special act to the contrary, the fares to be taken by the company on a railway operated by electricity for each passenger shall not exceed five cents for any distance not exceeding three miles, then not exceeding two cents per mile, or fraction thereof, for the distance actually traveled.

WEST TORONTO.

WEST TORONTO, July 27.—According to the report handed in by the city auditor's department to the board of control this morning, the total debt of ward seven, including local improvements and schools, amounts to \$1,153,950. The total assessment available for general rates is \$5,074,745 and for school rates \$3,838,255. For local improvement the municipality was authorized to issue \$100,000 debentures. Of these \$97,000 have been issued, \$87,000 paid, leaving outstanding \$10,000, at 5 per cent. per annum. The general debt was consolidated in 1898 at \$1,067,500; paid off, \$500,000; unamortized \$21,000; outstanding, \$1,041,500. This debt matured in January, 1904. The municipality of West Toronto had no sinking funds.

While visiting at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wm. Ellis, 80 Davenport-road, Mrs. Mary Ann Graham of Inland, Ont., died this morning. She was 80 years of age. The remains will be sent on Thursday morning to Craigvale for interment in Inland Cemetery.

Frances Mary Ellen Wilhelmna Pember, aged 33 years, died yesterday at the home of her sister, Mrs. Look of Lambton Mills. The funeral will take place on Wednesday at 2 p.m. to Humbervale Cemetery.

A new curb is being built around the vacant lot at the rear of the postoffice. The local officials have hopes that this property will ultimately be converted into a lawn, but when the improvements will actually take place nobody seems to know.

William C. Smyth, brother of T. J. Smyth of West Toronto, died yesterday afternoon at 433 St. Clarens-avenue. He was 48 years old and leaves a widow and six children. Other brothers of the deceased are John and Peterboro and Patrick of Grand Rapids, Mich. The funeral will take place to-morrow morning to St. Helen's Church and thence to Mount Hope Cemetery.
