

The Output of Gas for the year amounted to no less than two billion two hundred and twenty-six million one hundred and sixty-three thousand cubis feet, or nearly eleven per cent, over that of last year. The consumption of gas is rapidly increasing. The Company began its operations in the year 1348. After fifty-four years, say in 1902, the output of gas had reached 360,606,600 cubic feet per annum. In 1909, seven years later, the Company's output has amounted to two billion two hundred and twenty-six million cubic feet, being an increase of one billion three hundred million; the increase alone being nearly in very recent years.
