# SUNFIELD HEARS NEWS

Twenty Thousand Dollar Fire in Big Stove Foundry---General News of the City.

HAMILTON, Nov. 22 .- (Special.)-Fire hat did damage to the extent of \$15.-000 or \$20,000 broke out this evening at 6.50 in the Burrow, Stewart & Milne Stove Foundry. The fire started near the corner of John and Cannon-streets, and spread both ways. On the west it was blocked by a fire wall, and by clever work Chief TenEysk and his brigade had it under control in haif an hour after they were called. When they arrived the whole of the top end of the building was a mass of flames.

The trouble started on the second floor, and the flames shot up the elevator shaft to the third storey, burning about half way up the block on the top storey. The flames spread eastward on the second storey. The alarm came in when about one-third of the firemen were off for supper, and Chief TenEyck says that the council must give him more men. He has been kicking for months for more help. It was the first time that the new fire engine was used, and it did good work.

The Burrow, Stewart & Milne firm have been peculiarly unfortunate in the matter of fires, this being the third serious loss they have suffered.
