WEAKENED WANDERERS EASY FOR TORONTOS

The Denny boys had a large-sized night. Cyril netted four goals and brother Corbett contributed three for the grand total of seven, out of eight. The two Cornwall boys had it over everybody else on the ice and went from bell to bell and checked like fiends. Skinner and Keats showed class while they were on the ice. Donald Smith was the pick of the Wanderer forwards and Stephens rushed well for the locals.

It was not a top-top or interesting hockey. The Wanderers were so hopelessly outclassed that it was never close and thereby it lost interest. The Toronto routed the enemy with their back-checking and had system in their attack. BATTING LEADERS IN MANY LEAGUES

Ty Cobb won the batting championship of the American League and Larry Doyle led the sluggers of the National League. They were out in front by a fair margin, with no one to dispute their claim, but a glance through the baseball record will show that more leagues had their nominal leaders—men who played in a few games and smashed out a sufficient number of hits to boost their average above that of those who fought through the long campaign for the pennant. In several instances these nominal leaders played in fifty games or more, acting as pinch hitters, and their claim for preference might be honored by many.

There was that modest, sensitive and unassuming Benny Kauff. He chugged the ball for an average of .344, but Watson, who started with the Tip Tops and finished the season with the Buffalo Blues, was ahead of him with an average of .336 compiled in 29 games, in which he averaged the pitcher 48 times and poked out 19 hits. This was pretty heroic action by Watson, and the pity is that he did not get into the game more often. The might, perchance, have established a valid claim of supremacy.

Shortstop, the centre fielder of the Providence team, is entitled to consideration in the International League. He averaged the perfectly good average of .322, yet ranked only sixth. Chester Hoff, the left-handed pitcher with Rochester, went on a wild jaunt in his 28 games, facing the pitcher 62 times, and getting himself 25 hits. Charley Mullin, with Richmond part of the season, hit .319 in 38 games, while Ed. Barney, once with the Yankees, and later with the Pirates, averaged .314 in 31 games. Roy of Toronto was right up there with a mark of .332 in 97 games, and his claim is as good as any of the others. A man could not carry a spurt through so many games for such an average.

Jack Leveur, once with the Cleveland Naps and Rochester, later with the New York Yankees, and now with the Kansas City team of the American Association, might have had his feelings, but he always could bat. He was a consistent .300 stick in the majors, and he has shown no inclination to rest on his laurels in the minors. He was ranked in the playing thru 162 games last year, Jack rolled up an average of .346, and was the actual leader of the team. Leveur, a catcher, played 361 in seventeen games. Leveur played first base last year, and so cleverly, that he led the league in fielding as well as hitting.

Timmy Johnston, the outfielder of the Oakland team, who will be with the Superbas next summer, has about as strong a claim to supremacy. In his league he was the leader. Jimmy Johnston, in 206 games, was at bat 788 times and made 316 hits for the grand average of .348. He is placed behind Harry Wolter, once with the Yankees, who topped him by eleven points, but was placed in 56 fewer games. Wolter, from Hamilton and Brief, none of whom played in 100 games, also were ranked in front of the Superbas-to-be, but only Wolter has any more valid claim to the championship than he.

The South Atlantic, the Virginia and the Canadian leagues boast of men who have clear title to the leadership. Chas. Mace of Macon in the South Atlantic League stood out with a mark of .389. LABOR MEN APPEAL FOR EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Legislation Affecting Women and Working Class Suggested to Cabinet.

The Ontario executive committee of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, in the absence of Premier Hearst, waited on Hon. J. A. Macdormand yesterday and suggested legislation providing for equal suffrage, extension of the principle of proportionate representation, abolition of property qualification for candidates running for municipal office, reduction of hours for mine workers, changes in the Workmen's Compensation Act and legislation to prevent the manufacture of clothing in private homes.

Ex-Controller Simpson addressed the minister on the question of equal suffrage, and pointed out that although labor had been demanding votes for women for many years the government had not even extended the franchise to married women who owned property in their own right. Referring to the act recently passed by Manitoba he asked if Ontario was going to allow the younger provinces to pass them in the way of progressive legislation.

The changes in the Workmen's Compensation Act, recommended by Fred Bancroft, were that first aid provisions be made for the injured without having the expense charged up to the workmen. He cited cases showing the injustices of the present interpretation of the act.

Ald. Robins presented the case of the street railway men who want revision of the schedule of working hours.

Robb and Ald. Jos. Gibbons, street railway employees; Walter Rolfe of Hamilton, and others.
