They claim 78 out of \$2 constituencies in Ontario, 14 out of 15 in Manitoba, 14 out of 16 in Saskatchewan, 10 out of 1? in Alberta and all the seats in British Columbia and the Yukon, or 130 constituencies in the five provinces.

Won't Ostracize Quebec.

There is no menace to Quebec in the creation of a unionist party. The object is not to ostraciaze Quebec, but to secure a stable, aggressive war administration, and war candidates will be neminated in the various Quebec constituencies and the people of that province will be asked to support a government with such an object. French-Canadian representation in the cabinet has been somewhat reduced, but not as a punishment to French-Canadians, but owing to conditions that exist in that province. It is the desire of the new government as soon as possible to give adequate repre-sentation to Quebec and the French-Cancdian people. 
