## Metric System

Many people thought there would be an evident change of policy with reference to the western farmer once one of the most well known western farmers got into the government. While he is gone they are attempting to sneak this through the House. I wish he were here tonight with his eloquence. The hon. member for Assiniboia (Mr. Goodale) misses the right hon. member for Prince Albert in view of the attention he paid him a week or two ago in a debate in this House.

We are all waiting to see what the Minister without Portfolio will announce in connection with this bill. Is he going to let us talk until 10.15 before he gets to his feet to announce that while the Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau) has been away there has been a dramatic coup, we have a new Prime Minister, and the metric bill is being withdrawn? Is that what is going to happen?

The Prime Minister of the Seychelles went to the Commonwealth Conference in London. Lo and behold, two or three days later he was no longer the prime minister of the Seychelles. He did not have a "Sey" and he did not have a "chelles". He is out in the cold. Could the same thing happen to the right hon. member for Mount Royal? Could he be removed while in London at this Commonwealth Conference?
