**THE ALMORA HAD A**  
**VERY ROUGH TRIP**  
Donaldson Liner Arrived This  
Morning—She Brought Miners  
for Queen's Co. Mines—Two  
Other Steamers in.

After a very stormy passage of nineteen  
days, the Donaldson line steamship Almora  
in command of Captain Turner, arrived in  
port this morning. Head winds and heavy  
seas were met with almost all the way  
across the Atlantic. The steamer brought  
400 passengers, 1000 tons of Scotch  
Vincent, Robert McNish, Thomas Wad-  
dell and family, Thomas Knight, Thomas  
McKendrick and J. McRorie. The men  
are all miners brought out by the Rothwell  
Mining Company of Minto N. B.  
The Almora has a very large cargo, in-  
cluding 4200 tons of Scotch and 80 tons of  
hard coal. The steamer is now at the new  
city wharf, where she will discharge her  
St. John freight, which will be moved  
over to No. 4 berth where she will  
discharge her western freight. After dis-  
charging some freight here, she will pro-  
ceed to Baltimore. Pilot Patrick McVie  
brought the steamer into port. This is  
his first steamer as a full-fledged pilot.
