LUMBERMEN.

Northern, sent to Algoma 7 comfort bags, 918 pages of literature, and to Wiarton 6 comfort bags, 1,200 pages of literature.

Central sent to Huntsville 120 papers and periodicals. Answers received much appreciated.

Creighton sent to Burks Falls 2,600 pages of literature, 1 comfort bag, 1 New Testament.

Willard sent 2 dollars towards Missionary's salary. 2 parcels sent to Algoma camps each containing a New Testament and a hymn book and scrap book and in one 2,100 pages of literature, and in the other 1,350 pages.

Deer Park, parcels were sent of good literature to 7 lumber camps, 3 hotels and a barber shop.

Mrs. Dick, of Deer Park, sent \$3.00 towards Missionary's salary.

Our Lumber Camp work has not been as extensive the past season as we could have wished, owing to dullness in the lumber trades. I wrote to the managers to whom we have sent parcels the previous seasons and received answers that no camps were at work. After a time I wrote again with the same reply. Later on I got information of camps at work and immediately notified those who had supplies ready for shipment. One Superintendent says, "have had quite a few letters from camps telling me of their work and how they spend their spare time. They spoke very highly of the literature and
