### AMERICAN SOLDIERS THROUGH PICCADILLY

With Pockets Full of Money, They Dine at Best Hotels and Teach Tommy to Shoot Caps

London, Aug. 29—London was overrun on Sunday with American soldiers and sailors. All the downtown streets and the city, especially in the Piccadilly district, were thronged with soldiers, some walking, some in taxis. Everywhere the Americans mixed with the Tommies, Australians, Canadians and Scotchmen in kilts, and all agreed that London was fine and Britain's soldiers were better. In some places the Britons were intimidated into the game of craps, and, as usual, the beginners won. Craps seems to have captivated attention. The Americans, who had not been at liberty since their departure from the United States, were lionized. At some corners women were standing, handing roses to soldiers, who pinned them on their hats. Many took advantage of the new Eagle Hat of the Y. M. C. A., which was thronged to the doors. One thing that was noted was the especially warm personal welcome extended to the men. Furloughed Belgians, Frenchmen or other soldiers of the Allies travel through the city in groups, by themselves, but every American group was piloted by at least one and sometimes half a dozen Britons. All the landmarks were pointed out, and in many instances mixed groups walked through the streets with arms locked. The American soldier is a mystery to the Englishman. Those in London yesterday having just been paid, had pockets full of money, which they were anxious to spend. They dined at the best hotels, some of them occupying tables adjacent to those at which British officers were seated. The only difficulty which they experienced with English money had to do with the value of the coin, to which they are as yet unaccustomed. They passed over pound notes in payment for small purchases, and took back a handful of change without counting it. "What's the use of counting it?" said one, "I could count the number of notes, but that's all. So we just trust to luck."

From the tops of crowded buses men and women waved at the Americans. It is agreed unanimously that London likes them, as much as they like London. The American blue-jeans have similar experiences, but many of them have been in London before and knew their way about.

### NEW WORLD'S RECORD BY A MOTOR BOAT

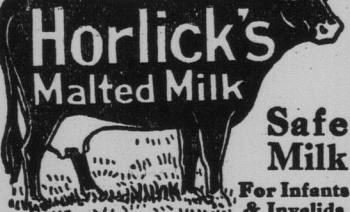
Miss Detroit II Averaged 56.3 Miles an Hour in Thirty Mile Race

Minneapolis, Aug. 26—A new world's record was established today by Miss Detroit II, driven by Gar Wood. Detroit, Mich., is the second of a series of three thirty-mile races for the Gold Challenge Cup of the American Power Boat Association. She covered the distance with an average speed of 56.3 miles per hour. Her average yesterday, which also was a record, was 50.7 miles per hour. On the first six-mile lap she averaged 59.5 miles per hour, the fastest time ever made for the distance in competition over a measured course. It was this good start that brought her average up to the race.

Miss Minneapolis, present holder of the gold cup, made an average speed of 52 miles per hour.

By the system of scoring one point for each boat starting, one point for finishing and one point for each boat defeated, Miss Detroit is in the lead with ten points and Miss Minneapolis second with eight.

Body of Two Year Old Boy Taken From Old Quarry

Hastings-on-the-Hudson, Aug. 29—The body of a two-year-old boy was found in a deep pool filling an abandoned quarry north of the Robert Behr estate in this village. It was found by Oswald Ardenberg, ten years old, who had worked his way through the dense underbrush surrounding the pool, in search of turtles. Working his way back through the shrubbery, the boy ran to the village police station and notified Police Captain Cronell, who accompanied him back to the pool. The police captain drew the body out of the pond, and found it wrapped about with cords, as if to afford a handle for carrying.
