

## WARNING IS GIVEN TO TORONTO GIRLS

Head of College Women's Union  
Urges Them Not to Go Out  
Alone

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—Following the recent visitation of an unknown intruder to Annesley Hall, the Victoria College women's residence here, and an outbreak of annoyances to girls, Mrs. Kirkwood, dean of women in university college and head of the Women's Union, has issued a proclamation forbidding university co-eds to go out after dark unaccompanied.

Mrs. Kirkwood's edict reads in part: "Women students are asked not to go out after dark without a companion. There have recently been several cases of annoyance and assault, the danger of which is infinitely lessened if a woman is accompanied. You are reminded that any accosting you from a motor car or on the sidewalk may be detaining you with intent. Too great care cannot be taken in obeying this precept."

## HUNTER IS HUNTED.



## CANADIAN RECTOR IS SOUGHT IN U. S.

Missing Six Months, Charged  
With Misappropriation of  
Funds

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 8.—A warrant charging misappropriation of funds of which he was trustee has been issued for the Rev. Thomas Hubert Jones, former rector of the St. Barnabas' Protestant Episcopal church here. The former rector has been missing six months. The warrant was sworn out by James Hill, who said he had placed checks for \$2,400 in the minister's hands to hold as trustee for his daughter.

The former rector was dropped from his church after his disappearance. He originally came from Canada.

## URGES TRADE BOARD FOR CHARLOTTE CO.

A. D. Ganong Tells Border  
Rotarians of Winnipeg  
Economic Conference

ST. STEPHEN, Dec. 7.—The St. Stephen-Milltown Rotary Club listened today to an interesting address by Arthur D. Ganong, who was one of the 21 delegates from the Maritime Provinces to attend the recent national economic conference at Winnipeg.

Mr. Ganong outlined the different resolutions that were presented and dealt with and said that he felt that this conference was one that should be given to the Telegraph-Journal and A. M. Belding, as they had been the ones to start the movement which had now grown into a great one.

Mr. Ganong said that this was the first time that the Saint John Board of Trade had taken hold of a movement that was not purely for Saint John and he said that that body was doing great work in this Maritime movement. He also stated that he felt a Board of Trade should be formed to take in the whole of Charlotte county.

## REMANDED ON THEFT CHARGE.

## TWO REPORTED ARRESTED.

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—While the news is not official, it is believed that two men have been placed under arrest in connection with the murder of Robert Tyhurst, who was fatally shot Friday night, while seated in his office at St. Michel des Saints, a village about 60 miles north of Joliette. Mr. Tyhurst was woods manager of the St. Maurice Paper Company, and resided at Three Rivers.

## TWO DIE SUDDENLY IN CITY ON MONDAY

Norman H. B. Smith Stricken in  
Street; J. H. Lightfoot in  
Depot

Norman H. B. Smith, well known harness maker, of the city, died suddenly in Prince William street, near the post office, yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock while walking with his wife. The ambulance and a doctor were called, but he was dead when they reached him.

Mr. Smith, with Mrs. Smith, had been talking to a gentleman near the post office and had just started to walk along the street when he stumbled and would have fallen on his face if he had not been caught by his wife and another woman who saw him stumbling. They let him down gently on the sidewalk.

## AMBULANCE CALLED.

A doctor and the ambulance were called and he was taken to the General Public Hospital, but he was dead when he reached there. His body was taken to his home, 5 Carleton street. This is the second stroke Mr. Smith had, the first coming on Aug. 2.

He was well known in the city, having been a life-long resident and having been owner of a harness shop in Germain street for a long time. A great many friends will mourn his loss and sympathize with his family.

Mr. Smith was 60 years of age. He leaves his wife, two sons, Fred and Norman, Jr., in Saint John, and two brothers, Fred, of St. George, and William, of San Francisco.

## PORTER DIES.

J. H. Lightfoot, of Montreal, colored porter on the Canadian Pacific Railway's train between Saint John and Montreal, died suddenly in the washroom at the Union depot, yesterday afternoon. He was about 65 years of age and had been in the service of the railway for many years.


