WEANS WORK FOR TWENTY THOUSAND

Plan for Conversion of Greatest of Plants Germans Used for War Material.

Paris, Dec. 29.—The Allied council of ambassadors has decided to place in the hands of Gen. Nollet, head of the disarmament commission, the task of converting the Deutsche Worke, the greatest of the plants used during the war for the manufacture of German armaments, into workshops for the manufacture of industrial machinery.

The plans will call for the employment of 20,000 workers who were employed at war material. The plants are at Munich, Cassel, Amberg, Dachan, Spandau, Hanau, Ingolstadt, Lippstadt and the former naval torpedo yards at Friedrichport, in the harbor of Kiel.


