## NEW INDUSTRY FOR CHINA.

To Make Electrical Apparatus Under the Siemens Patent.  
The manufacture of electric apparatus in China is overshadowed by the purchase in Soochow of seventy-five acres of land by the Electrical Appliance Manufacturing Company. This concern has also made arrangements with the Siemens Company in Germany, through which the Chinese company will be enabled to provide for the payment of a certain percentage of the profits. The Siemens Company will furnish the Chinese concern with a corps of experts, install and assist in the operation of the plant, according to Commercial Attaché Julian Arnold, who is stationed at Peking. The company chose to locate its plant in Soochow because land can be purchased there at less than one-tenth of the price asked in Shanghai. The location is only eighty miles west by water and fifty-five miles by rail from that city. Labor costs are also lower at Soochow than at Shanghai. S. T. See, a brother of the Chinese minister to Washington, is manager of the new concern. It will manufacture motors and electrical appliances suitable for the Chinese market. The initial capitalization is equivalent to about \$800,000 gold.

## FADING OF HAIR COLOR.

Blondes Are Least Sufferers From Passing Years.  
The color of our hair is due to the secretion of a varying amount of pigment or coloring matter, which, in turn, depends largely upon the percentage of various chemical constituents in our systems.

For example, a person with a large amount of iron in his blood usually manifests this by dark hair and eyes, while there are characteristics of blondes, brunettes and red-headed persons which have been worked out to a varying degree of precision by students of human nature.  
As we grow older, this pigment loses some of its intensity. The highly-colored cheeks of childhood and youth are replaced by the sallow, ashen complexion of advancing age, and the hair reflects a silvery white. Prolonged worry, fright or lack of sufficient light also have a marked effect upon the pigment cells which supply the hair.  
On account of the fact that hair needs a large supply of pigment, brunettes turn grey much sooner than blondes, while persons with extremely light hair frequently go through life without any alteration in color, though usually their hair loses most of its life and lustre.

## MOUND BUILDERS.

Until very recently the prehistoric race of Indians known as Mound Builders were commonly supposed to have congregated more definitely in the regions of the Ohio Valley, where evidences of their work are chiefly found in the mysterious mounds of that valley which have given to these almost mythical people their name. Some historians affirmed that their operations extended as far north as Lake Superior, on the northern shores of which copper mining had been carried on by a people more civilized than any discovered race of people since the dawn of American history, and therefore attributed only to the Mound Builders. And now comes a recent discovery clearly setting forth the same fact. Mr. McLaren, formerly of Fort William, farming on the banks of the Kaministiquia, is the discoverer of the site of an ancient city of some unknown race of people, whose civilization, from the discoveries made, is analogous to that of the Mound Builders. Out from the dim mists of antiquity a manufacturing city stands forth, possibly the centre of a large district. Evidences of copper mining are found in the form of numerous arrowheads of tempered copper. Pieces of pottery of a dark brown clay, unglazed, but ornamented, have been dug up, as well as arrow-heads, beautifully decorated and carved, proving their art to have been much less crude and amorphous than that of the Indians of the times of the early discoverers. A vein of the finest form which the arrows were made runs through this hill-top farm. A stone, very black, with a hole through the centre, has also been found, which adds weight to the theory that this ancient city was a Mound Builders' city, for it was by revolving such a stone on a stick that the Mound Builders obtained fire by friction. Further valuable discoveries are likely to be made which will reveal more of a civilization "behind the curtain of the years."
