FIFTY YEARS IN SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the origin of the International Sunday School Lessons will be a feature of the Sixteenth International Sunday School Convention at Kansas City, Mo., June 21-27, 1925.

For fifty-one years the Sunday School world has been familiar with the International Uniform Lesson a plan of study in which all classes from Beginners to the Adult Bible Class use exactly the same brief Scripture lesson for a given Sunday—the title of the lesson and the golden text being identical for every class. To some extent the "helps" are graded and adapted to the different age interests and capacities.

Before the Civil War in America the average Sunday School was primarily a test in memorization of Scripture. The boy or girl who could recite from memory the greatest number of verses Sunday after Sunday was considered the best pupil in the school. Knowledge of the Scripture was the supreme test, not the use of Scripture for training in right living.

But soon, due to improved methods in secular education, there was created a demand for better teaching and better helps in Sunday School literature.

Rev. John H. Vincent, a young Methodist Episcopal preacher in Chicago, recognized this demand and in 1868 founded the Sunday School Teacher, which was the forerunner of improved Sunday School lessons and helps for both the pupil and teacher. During this early period institutes were held in Newark, New Jersey, Springfield, Illinois, and Chicago, which gave the superintendents and teachers a vision of better methods of teaching and conducting the Sunday School, and the demand for the Sunday School Teacher became greater. Hence a uniform system of country seemed to be logical to Mr. Vincent, the editor of the Sunday School Teacher, the only teacher's journal then published. So in 1868 he attempted to prepare a course of uniform lessons on the Life of Christ for the use of the Sunday School Teacher of Chicago. These lessons were published in Sunday School Teacher and were soon used by schools all over the country. This same year Mr. Vincent was called to take charge of the Sunday School Department of the Methodist Episcopal Church, but he continued this course of lessons in the Teacher for the remainder of that year.

Rev. Edward Eggleston, the new editor of the Sunday School Teacher, then continued the writing and publishing of

Los Angeles, May 25.—Charges of conspiracy to assist Herbert W. Wilson, former evangelist of London, Ont., and alleged mail robber and murderer, to escape from jail, resting against his brother, Frank Wilson, and his reputed sweetheart, Helen Gillespie, were dismissed in the U. S. district court here yesterday. Frank Wilson had been unable to obtain a bond of \$25,000 and had been in the county jail since early in April. Miss Gillespie had been free under bond of \$5,000.

ONE PREVENTABLE DEATH A DAY

By an unfortunate typographical error it was stated on Saturday that "one person a day dies in Halifax."

Approximately 1,400 deaths occur here annually, and of these statistics show that 800 die of preventable diseases.

What do Canadian women believe about matters of national defence or especially of exclusively for Liberal Conservative women.

Today's article is not written by those who have long association with the older political parties; who have been brought up in homes where matters of Canadian political policy and the spirit of the Canadian nation have been the dominant considerations of the house hold.

All Canadian women must ask themselves what is necessary for Canadian national defence.

No nation whose eyes are fixed ever within its own borders can be a great power. Self-absorption and indifference to the world outside are not, however, the Canadian faults.

We Canadians believe that we belong to a far greater political destiny than that of any one political party, whether republic or monarchy.

It is necessary for us then to formulate a policy of national defence which will belong to Canada as a great nation with a great Empire. Canadian women will agree that the corner-stone of our defence system on land must be an organized body of citizen soldiers, such as the militia, with a limited measure of military training, whose one purpose is defence. The details of military policy must be left to expert advice, but all Canadian women will recognize that training of the militia is necessary.

In the same way, what Canada does with regard to naval defence, whether looked at more especially as her own or as a part of Empire defence, requires to be left to some extent to the guidance of experts. But it is impossible for Canadian women to contemplate that Canada should have no naval defence, and should not in some way make stronger the naval arm of the Empire.

We know that we can trust the people of every Canadian province to recognize this necessity elements of defence both on land and at sea. Liberals and Conservatives, those of every political party

Politics For Women

(Majorie MacMurchy in Toronto Mail and Empire)

It is believed that the political situation arising out of the great selection in the estimates for training the militia and the further situation which has developed regarding Canadian naval defence is a very serious character.

Our readers know, the Minister of Defence, Hon. Mr. Graham, was compelled to resign his department, judging by the estimates of \$700,000 in the militia estimates that they represented constituents who wished no waste expenditure on military matters. It is suggested that women who hold strong opinions regarding the necessity for essential measures of naval and military defence should not fail to communicate their views to members of parliament.

We should not allow our representatives in Ottawa to form any mistaken impression that we are indifferent witnesses to the political situation which has arisen in parliament.

There is no desire on the part of women belonging to any party to be unkind or ungenerous to Premier King. Why, however, did he take no stand as a leader either for or against the reduction of the militia estimates? We do not even know what his thoughts were, or indeed if he thought of the matter at all. Such a course of action is not leadership.

If anyone asks why national defence is a matter so important to women, the answer is easily given. National defence belongs to the spirit and character of a national industry, commerce and agriculture are maintained for livelihood and to promote material development. Civilian defence appertains to the same type of life as that which can be fostered only in homes. It is a matter of character and is not undertaken for gain. Women have always had a large responsibility for building national character. They have now an additional responsibility to express political judgment because of their enfranchisement. Upon whom do the pains and losses of the war, most heavily? The national defence policy which women require from the present House at Ottawa is neither a traditional Conservative or a traditional Liberal policy, but an all-Canadian policy of national defence, not what Laurier or Berden thought or proposed, but the wisest and best course of action, adjusted to Canadian requirements following the war, a policy which will receive the support of the great body of loyal and devoted Canadians.

DISCOVERS SOUTH PACIFIC ISLANDS; SETS UP U.S. CLAIM

Honolulu, T. H., May 25.—Word of the discovery of islands in the South Pacific hitherto unknown and now claimed in the name of the United States, has been received here. They were reported claimed by Lorin A. Thurston, a Honolulu publisher, who was cruising in the power-boat Palmyra.

He says he found them on May 10, in the vicinity of Kingman's Reef. Their location was described as N. lat. 6.23, W. lon. 162.18. The publisher told of an excellent harbor, which in his opinion provided a natural landing suitable for a fuel station.

CHILE TO RECEIVE LARGE PAYMENT FROM GERMANY

Santiago, April 21.—(A. P., by mail).—Chile will receive approximately 2,000,000 pesos gold from the German government in payment of expenses incurred in connection with the Internment of German sailors in this country during the war, according to an announcement by Dr. von Eckert, German minister here. The sailors were members of the crews of the German cruisers Dresden and Seeadler.

It was said that the inter-alleied commission which directs the payments of indemnities imposed on Germany under the treaty of Versailles has just authorized liquidation of the debt.
