In addition they are clever dancers and some of their eccentric steps are both difficult and cleverly done.

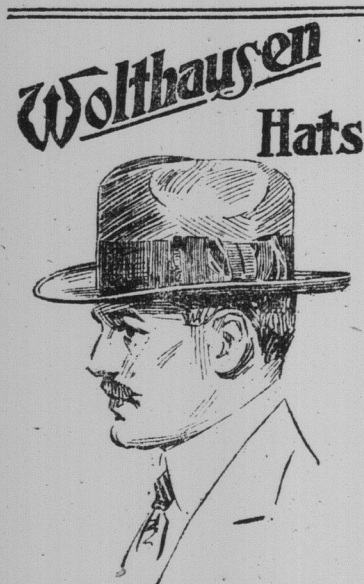
