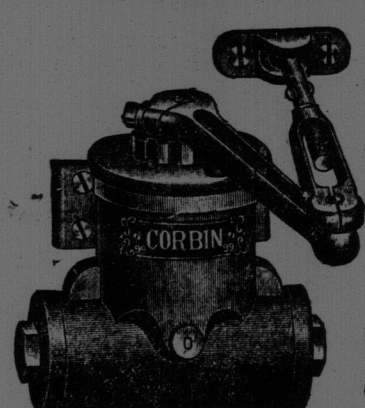

VISIT TO JAIL

INSTEAD OF THE \$50,000 REWARD

Finder of \$650,000 Pearl Necklace Arrested on Suspicion—Mystery Not Solved But Police Have a Clue

London, Sept. 18.—Augustus Horne, the finder of the \$650,000 pearl necklace, for which \$50,000 reward was offered, was taken to Scotland Yard tonight by detectives for examination, and is still detained there. Ex-Supt. Leach, who is engaged on the case in behalf of the underwriters, thinks that the jewels were discovered in the street, but he declines to enter more fully into the matter, as there possibly will be further arrests. On the other hand, it is asserted that one man whom the police are watching, was seen to pass along the road where the jewels were found some hours prior to their discovery. It is evident the mystery is not yet at an end, and it is freely declared by the London papers that some most dramatic revelations are yet to come.

Horne is a pianist, 40 years of age, living with a wife and three children in two rooms. After the find he spent the day with companions, not turning up at his work, and returning to his home till late evening, shortly before the arrival of detectives to take him to Scotland Yard. His wife only heard of her husband's good fortune from a newspaper. At first she expressed complete incredulity. "No such luck," was her repeated comment. Then, "We shall not get the reward anyway," and finally, "Well, if it is true and we do get it, I don't know what we shall do with that much money."

Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of marine and fisheries, arrived in the city last evening on his first visit to his home since his extended trip through the west. BORDEN AFRAID TO RUN IN HALIFAX

According to Acadian Recorder—Report That Senator Dennis May Be Made High Commissioner in London

Halifax, Sept. 18.—The Acadian Recorder prints an interesting report tonight. Referring to the conference of Halifax Conservatives and the Right Hon. R. L. Borden yesterday, it says: "It was understood that Premier Borden will not run for Halifax again, it being considered too risky. The candidates will probably be F. B. McCurdy, M. P. for Shelburne and Queens, and his running mate will be W. F. O'Connor. John R. MacLeod will be the candidate in Shelburne and Queens."

Under the senate and the house at Washington regarding the proposed duties on wheat and flour it is probable that both these articles will go on a free list.
