LORD KITCHENER IN EGYPT

Welcome Has Been Most Hearty—Bends to Custom and Footmen Now Precede His Carriage

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 10.—Lord Kitchener is still a favorite subject of comment in the Egyptian papers of all languages, Arabic, French, English, English-French, German-French, Greek and Italian. He is the "atill strong man in a blazer" that Tennyson longed for. His welcome to Egypt was really remarkable. The crowds that gathered to meet him on his arrival in Cairo, included all classes of the community, and were largely composed of Egyptians, who cheered him as probably no one has been cheered in the streets of Cairo before.

There was no doubt due in part to the new agent-general's military reputation, first established in Egypt and since enhanced in South Africa and India, but that is not the whole explanation, though the prestige counts for much in Egypt, in all eastern countries. Kitchener stands for justice and efficiency. That is recognized on all hands. He is believed to be just and efficient himself and to insist on these qualities in those associated with him in his work.

Some of the greatest problems Egypt has had to face and still has to face are matters of engineering, and Lord Kitchener's early training and experience as an engineer officer will be of service to him in considering these problems. The British officer in Egypt is as good as his compeer
