STRIKE TAKES ON UGLY ASPECT

Talk of Farmers Arming Against Striking Hands

Intimidation in Some Parts of England Against Importation of Non-union Labor—Norfolk Pay Sixpence an Hour.

London, April 4.—(Canadian Press)—Stories about the farmers of Norfolk County arming themselves against striking farm-laborers are exaggerated, yet the strike is assuming an ugly aspect and certain districts are being intimidated against the importation of non-union labor.

Crew Taken Off By Ice Patrol

Boston, April 4.—The coast guard cutter Tampa, on ice patrol in the North Atlantic, reported by radio yesterday that she had taken on board the survivors from the Newfoundland schooner Rita M. Cluett, abandoned at four o'clock yesterday morning.

FIVE YEARS MORE OF FEDERAL AID

Provinces to Ask Ottawa to Keep Up Road Grant

B. M. Hill to Represent New Brunswick Before Dominion Cabinet on April 11—Bills Before Corporations Committee.
