

CHIEF JUSTICE OF CANADA IS DEAD

Sir Louis Davies Passes Away in Ottawa—Born in P. E. I.

Ottawa, May 1.—Sir Louis Davies, Chief Justice for Canada, died here this morning at 12.35 after an illness of five days. He was 79 years of age.

At the last, his only son, T. A. Davies, and a daughter Miss Gertrude Helen Davies, were at his bedside. The home of the family has been so long in Ottawa that it is probable the funeral will take place here.

Surviving Sir Louis are: His widow, Lady Davies; a son, Thos. A. Davies, surveyor department of the interior; and three daughters, Miss Gertrude Helen Davies, Ottawa; Mrs. J. D. Hyndman, Edmonton, Alta.; wife of Judge Hyndman of the Alberta Supreme Court; and Mrs. C. A. Magrath, Chicago, wife of the son of C. A. Magrath, the former Canadian Fuel Controller.

Hon. Sir Louis Davies, K. C., K. C. M. G., Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, occupied a prominent position in the legal profession, in the field of politics, and finally on the bench for half a century. The late Chief Justice was a native of Canada's smallest province. He was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, a son of Hon. Benjamin Davies, formerly Colonial Secretary of that province, and his wife Kezia Attwood Watts, on May 4, 1845.

His preliminary education, he received in his home province, but, having taken up the study of the law, he went to London, England, and completed his studies at the Inner Temple. He was called to bar in 1866, and created a Queen's Counsel in 1880. Sir Louis Davies entered the field of politics, as a Liberal, at an early age. His early political activities were confined to his native province, where he gained the appointment of Solicitor-General in the year 1889. Three years later he was elected to the House of Assembly and in 1892 became Premier and Attorney-General of the Province. He remained in the office for three years, when he was defeated.

Following his defeat as Premier of Prince Edward Island, the late Chief

Justice took the provincial field for the Federal. He was elected leader of the Maritime Provinces Liberal Association, and made a political tour of the provinces in November and December, 1894.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier became Premier in 1896, he selected Sir Louis Davies as his Minister of the Marine and Fisheries. While a member of the Laurier Cabinet, Sir Louis participated in a number of important international conferences. He visited Washington two years running, in 1897 and 1898 in connection with the revision of the international regulations respecting Behring Sea seal fisheries, and also in respect to the negotiations for settlement of outstanding disputes between Canada and the United States. With the British Ambassador at Washington he signed the protocols of the preliminary negotiations for the appointment of a Joint High Commission. He was appointed, with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwright, one of the Joint High Commissioners representing Canada on the Commission which sat first at Quebec, and afterwards in Washington, for the settlement of all Canada's disputes with the United States.

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In July, 1897, the late Chief Justice went to London and argued the question of the application of the German and Belgian treaties to Canada, before the law officers of the Crown, on behalf of Canada. Two years later he was sent specially to England to lay before British ministers Canada's contentions with regard to the Alaska boundary, and while there submitted the case of the Dominion to Lord Salisbury and Mr. Chamberlain.

Sir Louis Davies resigned his portfolio in the cabinet on Sept. 25, 1901, and was appointed to the Supreme Court bench. On Oct. 28, 1918, he was appointed Chief Justice of Canada, in succession to Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, and in December of the same year he received the honor of appointment to the Imperial Privy Council.

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TWO ASSAULT CASES ARE HEARD

Husband Fined \$20 for Striking Wife—Other Case Dismissed.

William McGovern was charged by Felix Doucette with assaulting and beating him in the Sugar refinery, in a case heard yesterday afternoon in the Police Court. From the evidence adduced, it was shown that the com-

plaint had first struck McGovern with a sugar bag, and the latter retaliated with a cotton hook which tore a hole in Doucette's trousers. Magistrate Henderson expressed the opinion that both were to blame and dismissed the case.

Frank Cooper pleaded guilty to assaulting his wife, Gladys. Mrs. Cooper testified that her husband had struck her several times before, and that on this occasion he pushed her baby to one side and struck her in the face. Cooper was fined \$20.

A 15 year-old-boy was in court and pleaded guilty to acting with another in stealing two bicycles. The boy was represented by L. P. D. Tilley. Persons in court, as well as the boy's employer, stated that the boy had a good character, and the magistrate, after pointing out the seriousness of the offense, allowed the young fellow to go home with his parents under suspended sentence. The second boy in the case will probably appear today. The two bicycles have been recovered.

At the morning session of the court, one man charged with being drunk was fined \$5.

Ross W. Neal pleaded guilty to stealing goods valued at \$25 from Harry Green. He told the court that he was subject to spells and had no knowledge of stealing. As the complainant did not wish to press the charge, and some citizens had spoken in favor of the accused, Neal was allowed to go on suspended sentence. He left the court without his hat and refused to return for it.

Seven boys were charged with stealing bottles valued at \$30 from John Ross. All were allowed to go on suspended sentence, with the exception of one youngster who had been in the Boys' Industrial Home and had not completed his sentence. He was sent back to the Home to finish his term.

At a meeting of the Social Service Council in Chatham last week, a committee was appointed to consider the practicability of supervised playgrounds for the children of the town during the summer months, taking note of suitable grounds available, equipment, volunteer workers and expense involved, and report to the Council. Steps were taken to co-operate with the School authorities in encouraging a more complete attendance of children at the public schools.
