LOCAL NEWS

Charles Ward has been reported for illegally selling liquor at the One Mile House on Sunday.

The police report that they were compelled to extinguish no less than seven bonfires last night. The young folks were celebrating weddings.

The Donaldson Liner Hestia arrived in port this morning from Glasgow and docked at Long Wharf. The German steamer Hornsea, arrived from New York this morning and docked at No. 1 berth Sand Point and will load deals.

The remains of the late Alice H. Boyd the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. W. Boyd, were laid to rest in Cedar Hill cemetery this afternoon. Rev. Jas. Crisp conducted the services at her father's house at 230 and the funeral proceeded thence to Cedar Hill.

James McCannell, who was serving a two months' sentence in jail, escaped from the chain gang on May 13th. He failed to keep out of the city, and was this morning arrested by Policeman Hughes and remanded to jail.

The death of Mr. Levi Perles occurred on Wednesday, the 10th inst., at his father's residence, 11 Frederick street. Deceased was in the 34th year of his age. The funeral will be held Friday at 2.30 p. m. Interment at Fernhill.

A. W. ROBB WILL BE SECRETARY OF Y. M. C. A.

St. John Boy Now in Sydney Will Come Here Early in the Autumn.

A. W. Robb has accepted the position of general secretary of the local Y. M. C. A., and will probably take up the duties of the office early in the fall.

At a meeting of the directors of the Y. M. C. A. held last week to arrange for a secretary, it was unanimously decided to ask Mr. Robb to accept the position. A telegram to that effect was sent him this morning and word was received that he had decided to accept. Mr. Robb belongs to St. John and before taking up Y. M. C. A. work as a profession he was prominently identified with the local institution.

In 1888 after taking a course at the Lake Geneva training school he took the position of physical director of the St. John Y. M. C. A. After a year in that position he served for a while as assistant maritime secretary.

Since then he has been general secretary, first of the Charlottetown Y. M. C. A. and lately of the Sydney association. He comes to St. John highly recommended for the excellent work he has done in the latter town.

ARE YOU COMING OUT TONIGHT, MARY ANN?

"Nix" Says Mary, But She Made the Air Tunesful With Popular Melodies.

Persons walking along King street east this morning heard a rather mixed chorus coming from the police station. Mary Ann Reid, who was arrested for exhibition of a cell on one end of the central station corridor and, as she returned on the wooden cots of the cell, she sang as sweetly as she could some old love songs, in which several of the male prisoners joined. High above the song sounded the painful cries of little ten-year-old Charles Carlgren in a cell at the other end of the corridor. The boy was calling for his mamma, and promising that in future he would attend school. The uproar only ceased when Mary Ann gracefully slid off the bench in a drunken slumber, and little Charlie had no more tears to shed. Mary Ann won't be out tonight.

BODY OF GEO. CONNOLLY NOT FOUND YET

At a late hour this afternoon the body of George Connolly, who committed suicide by jumping off the ferry boat E. Rose yesterday morning, had not been found.

Searchers were out in boats until late last night grappling for the remains and the efforts were diligently continued this morning, but with no result. Those who harbor familiarity with the river at Indiantown have little hope of the body being recovered there and think that if it is ever found it is more likely to be below the falls in the harbor.

PROBATE COURT

Estate of the late Dr. Chas. H. Holden. Citation had been issued in this estate for passing the accounts in the lifetime of the late Judge Trieman and was adjourned over from time to time pending legislation making valid such adjustments. HAMPSTEAD AGAIN IN DIFFICULTY

Rudder Unshipped at Gagetown—Came Down Without Making a Stop as Far as the Narrows.

The steamer Hampstead returned to St. John last night in a disabled condition due to an accident to her rudder. The steamer was laid up for repairs last week after sinking at her wharf at Gagetown, and left for her first trip up river on Tuesday morning. Yesterday after leaving Upper Gagetown for St. John it was found that the rudder was not working, and on examination showed that the rudder was unshipped at the lower end.

By keeping on a straight course and not making any stops the steamer could navigate under its own steam. Accordingly the steamer came as far as the Narrows without making a stop. Here she was taken in tow by the tug W. H. Murray and taken to her wharf. Repairs will be made as rapidly as possible in order to enable the steamer to take her place on the route again without delay.

BOYS SENT TO JAIL TO BE KEPT FROM STARVING

No Lunch Would be Sent to Them in the Station Cells—John Smith Given Another Chance.

In the police court this morning Wm. Rogers pleaded not guilty to obtaining goods under false pretenses and was remanded to jail.

John McElroy, aged 21 and Michael O'Donnell, aged 18 years were charged with fighting on Sheriff street last night. It appeared that McElroy called O'Donnell some bad names and the men had hardly got well mixed up when arrested. They were fined \$20 each and allowed to go on suspended sentence.

John Smith, the tramp who was told by the magistrate to get out of the city yesterday morning, failed to do so. Some joker told him that as he was in search of work, men were wanted to work on the chain gang and to apply to Colonel Collins at the jail. This warning, told him to get out of town immediately and if arrested again he would be sent to jail for a year.

Charles Carlgren, aged 10 years and Harry McNally, aged 12 years were remanded on the charge of playing truant from school. McNally is an old offender. The magistrate ordered that the boys be placed in separate cells in the police station and that they be given something to eat as they were locked up last night. As breakfast is not served in the police station the little chaps must have been hungry when dinner time arrived and the prisoners in jail were to get their dinner. Officer Howell went into jail and asked for some food for the boys. He was told that the food would not be sent up to the station to them. In order that the boys could get their dinner the magistrate was obliged to remand them to jail which was done.

In Westmorland Daniel Jordan is appointed attending magistrate residing at Sackville in place of Walter Cahill, and is also made a Commissioner of the Sackville Civil Court. Robert C. Goodwin, of Bale Verte, is coroner. Patrick T. Legere is made a vendor of liquors in Memramcook in place of T. D. Melanson. Thomas G. Loggie is gazetted Deputy Surveyor General. The gazette also contains the appointment of D. McLeod Vince, George W. Fowler and David I. Welch to be Kings County. Notice is given of the assignment of Nathan Druker, of St. John, to Harrison A. McKeown for the benefit of creditors. A meeting of inspectors and other business is to be held in this city at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The gazette also contains a list of the bills passed by the Legislature at the session just ended.
