Department of Agriculture Makes Suggestions. Profitable Egg Production—Pullets for Winter Laying—The Fresh Egg Trade—Exporting Eggs.

For all farmers a most profitable branch of the poultry business is the production of eggs during the winter. Says F. C. Hare, chief of the poultry division, Ottawa. Every winter there is a great demand for new laid eggs; the supply is always limited, and high prices are paid. In the large cities strictly fresh eggs sold readily during the past winter at from forty to sixty cents per dozen.
