It is alleged that a few days ago the young man, being of a jealous dispo- sition, came to the conclusion that he had not a monopoly of his sweet heart's regard. To satisfy himself as to whether or not his suspicions were orrect, he told her he was going out of the city for a few days, and enjoined her not to make "goo-goo"eyes at any other fellow. He remained in town, however, and saw the object of his affections basking in the smiles of a rival.	Vesterday morning, however, she grabbed a razor out of the hands of the porter, who was paring his nails with the weapon at the time. The manicuring operations were tempor- arily suspended, and the porter was aghast at the action of the girl. Going into a room where her chum was she said she was going to commit suicide. The other girl went into hysterics, and soon the house was in a state of great commotion. The girl with the razor, pursued by other inmates of the house, rushed through the halls and reached her own room, announcing in an excited manner that she was going to kill herself. Before she was able to carry out her professed intention, how- ever, the owner of the weapon caught her, and after a struggle took it from her. "Never mind," she said, "I have a knife which is just as sharp as the razor, and I will do the job with that." Up to the time the Sun went to press, however, the deed had not been com- mitted. The young lady was to have been married in September, and feels her disappointment very keenly, but it is not thought she will make another at- tempt upon her life. 
