TALE IN ON FROM HARVARD IN FOOTBALL TRACK MEET, 55-5 TO 48-5; DECIED BY LAST EVENT

New Haven, Conn., May 15.—In the best of weather for fast time, Yale University beat her rival from Cambridge in the annual dual games on Yale field this afternoon, the margin of victory being 6-2 points. The total score, which was not determined until after the last trial in the broad jump was, Yale 55 1-2 points; Harvard 48 4-5. Three dual records were broken, and in two other events better than record time was made. In one instance the figure was not allowed and in the other the time was made in a trial heat.

Broken Records. Of the three records broken, the notable one was in the two mile event when H. Jaques, of Harvard, made the distance in 9 minutes, 46 4-5 seconds, which is 6 4-5 seconds under the record of M. H. Stone, of Harvard, three years ago. Cooney Broke Hammer Record.
