Mrs. Ellen Harrington, of South Boston and the Misses Mary and Margaret Casey, of New York, are sisters.

Winter Activities.
The boys of St. David's church are looking forward to a good time this winter, under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. J. A. McKelgan. Among other things a junior choir will be formed besides a branch of the Knights of King Arthur.

Road Houses Again.
The extermination of the road houses and the betterment of the liquor license act were the topics of discussion before the meeting of the Executive Alliance yesterday morning. Rev. Wm. Lawson was the speaker and said he saw no reason why the government should not be compelled to close up all the road houses.

Police Court.
Ten children, seven boys and three girls were brought before the magistrate yesterday morning. The magistrate lectured them and allowed them to go. The case of Wilbur Graham charged with attacking May Wright in his home, Marsh Road, was dealt with. Graham was fined \$20 or two months in jail. Four drinks were fined \$5 or two months in jail. William Williams was fined \$2 for obstructing the sidewalk in front of his premises, 15 Dock street.

Provincial.

Big Timber Deal.
Fredericton, Nov. 4.—A big deal in lumber lands was put through here today when the Fraser Lumber Company, of which Donald Fraser is president, became owners of the Scott Lumber Company's lands, \$2,000 acres in York, Sunbury, Queens and Carleton. The Victoria mill of this company is also in the province. The Fraser Lumber Company's property has been purchased by Messrs. Fraser.

To Study in St. John.
Moncton, Nov. 4.—The Brotherhood of the First Baptist church at a meeting on Sunday afternoon decided to hold a banquet during November. Dr. O. B. Price, M. P. P., chairman of the committee appointed to enquire into the advisability of asking the co-operation of churches and other institutions in organizing an associated charities board in Moncton, said the report would be submitted next Sunday. Meanwhile enquiry will be made regarding the work of the St. John board.

Passed Examinations.
Fredericton, Nov. 4.—Three candidates who wrote the recent law examinations here for admission as attorneys have all been successful in passing. They will be admitted at the opening of the next sitting of the Supreme Court on Banc here on Tuesday next. The three candidates writing the examinations were Frank M. O'Neill, of this city; J. J. Hayes Doone, of St. Mary's; and Iva C. Rand, of Moncton. Messrs. Hugh A. Carr, of Campbellton, and William A. Ryan, of St. John, as graduates of the St. John Law School, will be admitted at the same time. The report of the examiners will not be formally considered by the council of the Barrieters Society until the meeting of that body next Monday evening. The new barristers will not be admitted until Thursday, November 14th.

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WANT CITY'S HELP TO PAY THE EXHIBITION DEFICIT

Association Asks for Payment of \$3,000 Grant and \$5,000 Guarantee, but Council Wants to Know Why Balance from Dominion Fair is Not Used.

At the meeting of the City Council yesterday a communication was received from the Exhibition Association stating that the deficit on the show for 1912 was \$12,140.25, and asking for the city grant of \$3,000 and the guarantee of \$2,000.

The mayor observed that the association had a surplus of over \$10,000 from the Dominion exhibition which should have been carried over and the communication was referred to the commissioner of finance to report.

Carlton Hall Leased.
It was decided to lease Walter H. Golding the lower hall in the Carlton public building and permit Allison and Thomas to erect a post in front of their real estate office. A good deal of routine business was dealt with.

Com. McLeelan reported that the receipts for the month of October amounted to \$54,509.26. He recommended that the following accounts, certified by the comptroller, be paid: Treasury department, \$455.30; water and sewerage department, \$2,549.03; public works department, \$1,052.25; harbors, ferries, and lands, \$1,882.65; public safety department \$883.43.

Com. McLeelan reported that the lower hall in the Carlton public hall be rented to Walter H. Golding for \$300 a year the lessee to make repairs, pay for lighting and heating, and any additional insurance expenses consequent on use of hall for entertainment purposes. The recommendation was adopted.

Want a Lamp Post.
Com. Agar recommended that Allison and Thomas be granted permission to erect a lamp post with four lights and a sign in front of their premises on Prince William street. The design to be approved by the engineer.

Com. McLeelan opposed the adoption of the recommendation as he thought it would establish a bad precedent. He thought that while the lamps might be desirable they should first decide on the conditions under which they might be erected, otherwise they will make the use of the public property a bad precedent.

Com. Agar thought the city had the power to protect the public interest and that the use of the public property for a large and delighted audience referred to the commissioner of finance to report back.

The council then adjourned.
