CHURCHILL GETS FORTUNE.

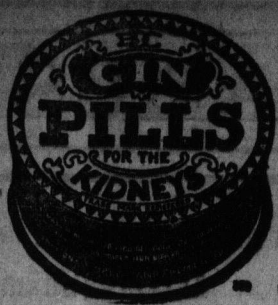

German Plant Gets Condemned Material

Guns and Ammunition Captured During War Sold for Scrap Iron.

Berlin, Jan. 30.—Guns, rifles, ammunition and other war material to the value of 40,000,000 marks, captured by the Germans in the war from the Belgians, Russians and Japanese, were turned over yesterday by the inter-allied commission to a German iron plant where they will be melted and converted into articles of trade. News of a selection of a German plant, the German Burgher Iron Works, in spite of keen foreign competition, was received with elation in industrial circles as Germany is badly in need of scrap iron which it cannot purchase in sufficient amounts in foreign countries on account of the depreciated value of the mark.

City Assessment Has Been Reduced

Citizens Will be Asked for \$123,000 Less Than They Were Last Year.

On the basis of last year's valuation the tax bills received by the citizens this year should be quite a bit less than they were last year as the amount to be assessed, for, despite the increase in the county assessment, is over \$124,000 less than it was for 1920, and this should mean a cut of at least twenty cents per hundred in the rate.

New Source of Revenue. It is understood the assessors have discovered some new sources of taxation on real estate, but without in any way increasing the valuation now placed on that class of taxable property, will bring in a considerable amount of revenue and this should still further decrease the rate which will be struck this year.

Last year the amount asked for by the county from the city taxpayers was \$124,337.55, and this amount is increased this year by nearly \$45,000, the warrant handed to the board of assessors by the county secretary calling for \$355,004.35, or \$44,666.64 more than was asked for in 1920.

City Pruned Well. The City Council used the pruning knife to good effect and succeeded in reducing their requirements very materially. Last year the total assessed by the Council was \$1,229,143.24, while this year's total is \$1,130,299.39, or \$168,242.21 less. From this amount must be deducted the amount of the increase in the county warrant, \$44,666.64.

The total warrant last year including the county was \$1,613,545.90, and this year it will be \$1,489,702.99, a net decrease of \$124,242.21.

IN THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

To the Editor of The Standard.
Dear Sir:—Three points that have emerged through the recent discussion of Vocational Education in St. John are of more than local interest and affect the movement throughout the whole province. I would appreciate the privilege of making a brief statement with regard to each, through your paper.

First, it has been alleged "that practically any one who so desires may claim to be a Vocational teacher." This is decidedly not the case. The teacher must have a thorough knowledge of the practice and theory of the subject, she teaches and in addition should have a knowledge of the art of teaching. At the beginning of the work in New Brunswick, as in other places, it is necessary to select expert workers from the various vocations and give them temporary permits to teach till they have time and opportunity to fully meet the professional qualification necessary for a permanent license. Nova Scotia and Ontario have been working this field for ten years and are still issuing temporary permits.

The policy of the New Brunswick Vocational Education Board, with reference to the important matter of teacher training, is to carry on a summer school each year for the professional improvement of the teacher; to offer evening professional courses in the larger communities; and to pay the travelling expenses and tuition of approved persons wishing to take advanced courses at standard training institutions outside the province with a view of becoming vocational teachers in New Brunswick. Already several are taking advantage of this offer, and 80 were in attendance at the 1920 summer school.

New Brunswick has agreed to join with the other provinces in establishing a central institution for training vocational teachers in Canada. It is hoped to have this school in operation next year. It will be located in Ontario or Quebec.

By the above means the Vocational Board will soon have a permanent force of thoroughly equipped teachers to man the day and evening vocational schools. Meanwhile, we are compelled to employ those who possess practical efficiency and who are willing to improve their professional skill as opportunity offers. But every teacher must be approved. Second—as to qualification of students. It has been said that all and sundry are accepted in an effort to get "anyone at all to fill up the classes."

The law says anyone may attend Evening Vocational classes who has reached the age of 15, and who is to profit by the instruction given. At present there is a waiting list in St. John city of over 300 applicants. At the time of registration each student is interviewed. A careful record is made of his educational history and experience. His aptitudes and opportunities are studied and every effort made to land him in a class that will be of real help to him in his vocation.

At the outset there are great difficulties. Those possessing some training appreciate the value of training most. Those in the greatest need are the slowest to join the classes. But the only solution is to begin with those who present themselves and expand the movement from this starting point till it embraces the elements of the community.

Third, great confusion seems to exist in the public mind as to the constitution of "local vocational committees charged with the administration of the work. In this connection, the N. B. Act is patterned after that of Ontario and the Western Provinces.

The School Board appoints and controls the Vocational Committee, which is made up as follows: Four members from the School Board, and three others who represent labor, employers, and homemaking, respectively. The chairman and secretary of the School Board hold by law the same offices in relation to the Vocational Committee, and the budget of the latter must be approved by the School Board in every case. Vocational training is, therefore, an integral part of our school system just as it is in Ontario and Saskatchewan.

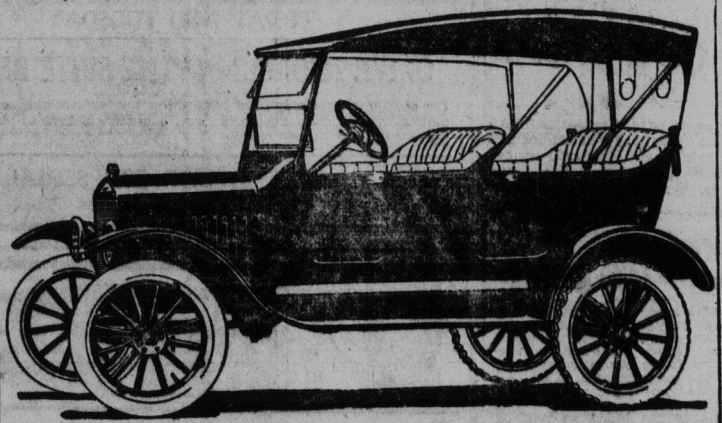
