

ALBERTA FIGHT ENTIRELY UPON LOCAL PROBLEMS

Farmers Think Gov't Has
Made Mistake in Calling
Election Now.

AGRIANS READY FOR LIVELY BATTLE

Calgary and Edmonton Will
Run Independent Tickets as
Well as Regular.

Edmonton, Alta., June 24.—The Stewart administration will appeal to the country in the Alberta provincial elections of July 18, on a platform largely built of natural resources, scientific research, irrigation, and other features of the government's policy, pointing out at the same time that the need of additional revenue is steadily increasing. A settlement of the natural resources question is said by the premier to be now assured an agreement having already been reached with the Dominion Government on which the principles on which it will be based. The revenue from these resources, when so arranged, will be applied to educational work, to the development of the natural resources, and to the scientific and industrial research, and to further work along public health lines.

Agriculture

Agricultural production will be increased says the manifesto by a prosecution of the irrigation and drainage policy which has now been definitely decided upon.

The campaign of the Conservative opposition will be fought mainly on a platform of criticism and protest in regard to the government's financial record.

The farmers already organized for political action in six constituencies of a total of fifty-four and several conventions have been arranged for during the week of July 1.

The U. F. O. platform will be frank in the desire to secure larger farmer influence in the legislature, with a view to protecting and promoting agricultural industry. Independent tickets will be run in Edmonton and Calgary, and possibly in other of the larger centres, on which civic interests of opposed to purely provincial consideration will be emphasized.

"Tactical Blunder"

Calgary, June 24.—H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta, during the course of an interview today, stated that the holding of an election in Alberta was a "tactical blunder" as the farmers had not expected an election so early. He could not say whether they were ready for this or not, in as much as all political activities were left in the hands of the officials of each constituency.

"Mounties" Fight The Doukhobors

Lively Fight When They Attempt to Arrest Census Statistics Refusers.

Nelson, B. C., June 24.—A battle royal between police and Doukhobors, both sides from the Grand Forks Doukhobors community and the Grand Forks post of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, occurred in the Doukhobors area near Grand Forks early Wednesday morning. The Doukhobors refused to answer certain questions, on the technical charge of refusing information to the census enumerators.

While Sgt. G. O. Reid was endeavoring to handcuff one of the men he was assaulted from behind by a Doukhobor who endeavored to throw him into the river. Overpowered, the sergeant was rescued by another Doukhobor, who was brought before Magistrate Neil MacCallum and given fines of \$20 each, with the alternative of 30 days in jail, and being also recommended for deportation.

MOTOR LORRY BOMBED

Dublin, June 24.—A military lorry was attacked this afternoon at the junction of North Frederick and Dorset streets, bombs being thrown at the lorry, two of which landed in it. The casualties to the military have not been reported, but five civilians were wounded in heavy rifle firing which followed the attack.

R-38 Has Made First Test Flight

Flew for Six and One-Half
Hours—Carried Forty-Eight
Persons on Trip.

London, June 24.—The giant British built airship R-38, which has been bought by the United States and will be flown to that country by a U. S. crew, took the air for the first time last night, making an entirely satisfactory flight, it was announced by the air ministry today.

The R-38 left the Cardington station at 7:55 p. m. and landed six and one-half hours later after a flight over the nearby countries. She carried 45 persons, including the members of the crew.

Baptists Meet At Woodstock

One Hundred and Ten
Churches With Membership
of 7,000 Are Represented.

Woodstock, June 24.—The first session of the Western Association of United Baptists opened this afternoon under the temporary organization, F. L. Atherton, temporary chairman, presiding. The delegation was representative, coming from all parts of districts 1, 2, 3 and 4, which composed this association, having in its confines 110 churches with a membership of over 7,000.

An opening explanatory address was made by Rev. G. L. Nash. This departure from former methods is adopted to come more closely to the local church that their interest may be increased. Necessary legislation has been passed to permit this division.

Evangelism.
The matter of greatest interest of the afternoon was a paper on evangelism presented by Rev. H. R. Bell. This paper after showing the history of large evangelistic movements, and their value laid great stress on personal work. This was followed by a live discussion by many who saw the value of this work from various angles.

The report on Grand Ligne was presented by Rev. E. J. Barras. In this school there has been an enrollment of 195 coming from Quebec, Ontario, the Maritime Provinces, United States and France, and embraced Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Congregationalists, Anglicans, Roman Catholics and Jewish faiths. The year has been one of much success.

Rev. E. Bosworth, of Grand Ligne; Rev. H. T. Dewolfe, of Wolfville, and Rev. J. A. Glen, of India, are among the visitors outside the association.

Sinn Feiners Wreck British Troop Train

Was Carrying Soldiers Which
Had Been Guarding King
and Queen During Visit.

Belfast, June 24.—A troop train conveying soldiers from Belfast to Dublin was wrecked today at Abercromby, near Dundalk, by the explosion of a Sinn Fein land mine.

Two soldiers and one of the train guards were killed, and many others wounded. Two special trains with soldiers and horses who had participated in the reception of King George and Queen Mary on the state opening of Ulster parliament Wednesday had passed over the spot safely.

The third train was wrecked at a steep embankment when the mine exploded, most of the carriages falling over the embankment. Physicians were immediately rushed to the scene.

BUY GERMAN STEAMER

London, June 24.—The White Star Steamship Company has purchased from the reparations commission through Lord Inchausti the former German liner Columbus now at Danzig. The steamer will be put on the South-Atlantic-New York service. She has a capacity of 2,700 passengers.

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ADOPTS BANKING LAW

Mexico City, June 24.—A banking decree, designed to prevent panics and compel financial institutions in Mexico to operate on a more solid basis, was issued yesterday by President Obregon. The decree, which becomes effective on August 1, provides for gold reserve covering deposits and other guarantees.

Failed To Deposit And Went To Jail

Thomas Ramsey Had Liquor
In Possession—Dispute
Over a Dog.

Thomas Ramsey pleaded not guilty to the police court yesterday afternoon to the charge of having liquor in his possession other than in his private dwelling. He requested time to secure counsel and the case was postponed to this morning. Failing the required deposit of \$200, the defendant was remanded to jail.

A case arising from a dispute over the ownership of a dog in which Mrs. Brown and Fred Haines are the principals, was postponed to Tuesday at 11 o'clock. The "thousand witnesses" who were to prove one of the parties' claim to the dog did not materialize at yesterday's hearing.

Pat Daley, "A native of Denmark," was before the court for being drunk and having liquor in his possession. He was fined \$300 or eight months in jail, and remanded.

John A. Simmonds was fined \$50 for leaving over the bridge at the reversing falls at a speed in excess of that allowed by the law. The caretaker, Samuel Shank, stated Mr. Simmonds' car went across the bridge at a speed of twenty-five miles an hour. The limit allowed by law is six miles per hour.

Dr. Robert Fenderigh, an internist at the General Public Hospital, Sergeant-Detective Powers, and Detective Bid-descombe, gave evidence in the case of Daniel Sullivan charged with a serious offense against a fifteen year old girl. The accused was sent up for trial.

\$6,666 Fee For Collecting \$20,000

Lawyer Says This is Quite
Reasonable—Average Earn-
ings \$1,000 Per Day.

New York, June 24.—One-third the total amount collected for a client is not an exorbitant fee, according to Max D. Steiner, a trial lawyer, in an affidavit submitted to Supreme Court Justice Whitaker, which states that for several years his services have commanded a very high compensation, or an average of \$1,000 a day for 300 days a year.

The court heard the application of Mrs. Amelia Hamburger, widow of Louis J. Hamburger, to compel Mr. Steiner to return two notes, each for \$10,000 of the Constable Lumber and Supply Company on the ground that he is unlawfully withholding them and claiming \$6,666 for services not worth more than \$3,500.
