Wash-out Near Upper Dorchester.
Moncton, August 1.—(Special)—Traffic on the I. C. R. east of Moncton was interrupted for some hours last night by a wash-out on the road about three-quarters of a mile east of Upper Dorchester. The wash-out was caused by high tides in the Chaleur River and occurred at Brownell's bridge. Temporary repairs were effected after the wash-out, so that traffic could pass the point shortly before midnight. In consequence of the wash-out the Maritime Express did not reach Moncton until about one o'clock this morning.

AIMED TELLING BLOW AT RUSSIAN POWER

Premature Finland Meeting Uncovered Huge Plot to Seize Cronstadt, Sevastapol and Sveaborg

Helming, July 31.—A gigantic military conspiracy, aimed at the simultaneous capture of Russia's three great sea fortresses, Cronstadt, Sevastopol and Sveaborg, arranged by the revolutionary military league, was prematurely sprung here last night by the attempt to arrest members of a company of aspects who had mutinied on account of the death of one of their comrades, alleged to have been due to ill treatment.
Only Four Companies Loyal.
The entire garrison of the fortress at Sveaborg flamed out instantly in revolt. All the artillerymen and sappers garrisoned the place were involved. Only four companies of infantry remained loyal.
The mutineers seized forty machine guns
